

Will of E. W. Liggins.

In the name of God, Amen, —

I, E. W. Liggins, of the County of Lee and State of Georgia, being of sound mind and memory and considering the uncertainty of this frail and transitory life, do therefore, make, ordain, publish and declare this to be my Last Will and Testament; That is to say, First, After all my lawful debts are paid and discharged, the residue of my Estate, Real and Personal, I give and bequeath, and dispose of as follows; to-wit: — I bequeath to my beloved wife the Land and Appurtenances situated thereon, known and described as my Dooly place, lying in Fourteenth District Dooly County, State of Georgia, to be sold immediately, and pay off all my just debts, and what is left to be used for the purpose of getting a Gold Watch to be given to my Son William Davis, and get such things as she thinks fit stands in need of, and I further bequeath to my Step-Son George A. Beaumont, One Bay Horse Star, and One double barrel gun. And I further bequeath to my beloved wife and to my Son William Davis, and to my Step-Son George A. Beaumont, each to share alike all the remainder of my Estate, lying and being in the Fourteenth District of Lee County, My Beloved Wife's share at her death to return to my Son William Davis, and to my Step-Son George A. Beaumont, to be divided equally between them. Likewise I make constitute, and appointing my Beloved Wife Martha A., Executrix of this my Last Will and Testament hereby revoking all former Wills by me made, — In witness whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name, and affixed my seal, the Fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred & Seventy One: — E.
