State of Georgia } In the name of God, Amen,  
 Lee County } I, John B. Smith of said County and State,  
 being of advanced age, but of sound and disposing  
 memory, knowing that I must shortly depart this life,  
 deem it right and proper that I should make a  
 disposition of the property, with which a kind  
 Providence has blessed me, I do therefore make  
 this my Last Will and Testament, hereby revoking  
 and annulling all others by me here before made, -

Firstly = I desire and direct that my Body be buried in a  
 decent and Christian-like manner, suitable to my  
 circumstances and condition in life, my Soul I trust  
 shall return to God who gave it, -

Secondly = I desire & direct that all my just debts be paid without  
 delay by my Executor herein after named & appointed, -

Thirdly = I desire & direct that my Doctor Bills & all my Atty.  
 fees be paid advance by my Executors, with after my  
 Burial Expenses <sup>Lee County Wills 1854-1891</sup> if there be any due at my death, -

Fourthly = I give and bequeath to <sup>www.georgiapioneers.com</sup> Samsie Smith for her  
 kindness to me and my dear wife during our lives,  
 all the money due me on the notes against Mah Little,  
 said notes given for the Land previously owned by me,  
 after all the Expenses are paid out, said money to be  
 invested in a house for Samsie & her Children, -

Fifthly = I give & bequeath to Miss Samsie Smith, One Red & White  
 spotted Cow & calf, to have and to hold for the  
 benefit of said Samsie & her Children, -

Sixthly = I give & bequeath to said Samsie Smith all the balance of  
 my property, if I leave any more than I have not  
 mentioned in this my Last Will and Testament, -

Seventhly = I hereby constitute and appoint my friend J. B.  
 Farmer Executor of this my Last Will & Testament, -  
 This February 11<sup>th</sup> 1895, - John B. Smith, (L.S.)

Court of Ordinary April Term 1875. -  
 Whereas S. H. Sumner, has presented to this Court  
 a paper purporting to be the Last Will & Testament of John  
 B. Smith, late of said County, deceased, and further  
 sheweth that the said John B. Smith departed this life  
 Dec'd on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of March 1875, in said County,  
 and whereas the said will purports to have been  
 made on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of February 1875, & witnessed by  
 J. F. Watson, S. A. Sullgrove and G. B. Watson, & whereas  
 the said proponent hath introduced J. F. Watson  
 one of said witnesses, who being duly sworn says  
 that he saw J. B. Smith, on the day & year aforesaid,  
 sign, seal and declare said paper to be his Last  
 Will and Testament, in the presence of all the wit-  
 nesses, who all signed the same as witnesses of  
 his request, and in the presence of each other;  
 Therefore, It is ordered by the Court, that the said  
 Last Will & Testament of John B. Smith, be &  
 the same be admitted to probate in this Court in  
 Common Form of Law, and it is further ordered  
 that the said S. H. Sumner be & is hereby confirmed  
 as Executor of the Last Will and Testament, he having  
 taken the oath in terms of the Law. Witness my
