Cook, deceased, on the first day of March 1863, and were witnesses to a conversation had between said J. P. Cook, with his Brother B. H. Cook and his wife. The said Cook spoke of approaching his death and in view of the same he stated in our presence as witnesses the following in substance, i.e.:-

1st That his stay on Earth was short.

2nd, That after his death he desired that all his just debts should be paid as soon as practicable.

3rd That after the payment of his debts he desired that the whole of the balance of his property should be divided between his wife and Children share and share alike.

4th. That he desired that his Brother Benjamin H. Cook should have Charge of his Business and execute his will. In witness whereof we do hereby set our hands and Seals, this 24th day of March 1863.
