denomination whatsoever, I leave to my Brother Isaac Cutbush, during his
life, and at his death be equally divided between my nephews Alfred and
John Alexander Cutbush. - My Brother Isaac shall without immediate
pay to William Cullage, as to Administrator of the Estate of George Cullage.
On the Eighth day of February 1845 Two hundred and Seventy dollars. - And
also to pay John Lawson Sen. Twenty dollars Cash. - And Lastly I do
Ordain and Appoint my Brother Isaac Cutbush my sole Executor, and
in case of my decease before the Arrival of my Brother I request & desire
to take Charge of my papers and premises in my last testament & wish
to deliver them to my Brother Isaac Cutbush. In Testimony whereof I do

pretend to have or claim of or to my Estate real or personal Secondly I give, devise
and bequeath, All and whatever Estate I may possess I may possess now or hereafter
may in, right of myself Real and personal Subject to the payment of Eight hundred
Dollars and expences to my daughter Phoebe Lanchester the daughter
Phoebe Lanchester to her, her heirs and assigns for ever provided the said Phoebe
should so long live as to attain to the Age of Twenty one years or day of her marriage
which may first happen But should it so happen that she should die in minority and not being married Then it is my will and desire
and I do give and bequeath such increased Estate as my said daughter may hereafter
entitled to receive to my affectionate Son the said John Lanchester My Sister Elizabeth
Lanchester my brother Robert & Timothy Lanchester and to the Children of my dear
Sister Ann to be equally divided to and amongst them there and there amongst them
