 and State aforesaid - Unto my Sister Harriette Sharp, likewise two hundred
 Acres - To my Sister Catherine Beadt, also Two hundred Acres, and the
 remaining four hundred Acres unto my Sister Sarah Van Yveron - All
 my property real and personal, I now possess in the State of Georgia, or my
 hereafter acquire (after my debts be therout paid) I leave to the use &
 behoof of my Wife Dorothy Van Yveron, and the income thereof to be
 appropriated for her maintenance and support - & after her death down
 the whole (with the increase if any should be) is to be disposed of by
 the 1/4 proceeds vested in my four Sisters aforesaid share and share alike
 unto their and heirs for ever - Lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint
 my Wife Dorothy Executrix & James James of this County and State of New
 York, of Albany in State of New York Executors to this my last Will and
 Testament. My Witnesses whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, at
 Sunbury, Georgia, this tenth of June in the year of our Lord One thousand
 eight hundred and six.

Issue, my Will is that the personal property I got by Mr. Robert Beard
shall go to Orlando Shepards the son of Grand Shepard and the said Orlando
shall have the use of the income of said property before he comes of Age or my
executors shall see necessary, if the said Orlando die before the Age of Twenty one
Years, in that case the property mentioned to Orlando, shall go to David the latter
of Orlando; if both die under Twenty one then the said property, mentioned
to Orlando shall go to my Heirs, the rest of the property shall be at my last
disposal; I constitute my beloved Wife Ann Clark, executrix, and my Nephew
Thomas Baker, my friends John Nixon, and John Cogswell, Executors of this my
Last Will & Testament, revoking and annulling all other Wills and Testaments
heretofore by me made in witness whereof my hand this 7th day of March 1763
the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & seven
