State of Georgia, County of Liberty, 17th May 1814.
The State appears being at the time of his death possessed of no estate or property of any value, but what he left to his wife and children. In the first place, I find it is my husband William T. Lawson, the first named, who left me and my children, in the sum of one hundred dollars per annum, the full amount of the under mentioned negroes during his widowhood. Also these natural increases of the same. The names of the negroes are as follows:—
Sammy, Sarah, Peter, Charlotte, Lucy and
Anna. At or upon the death of my husband, I gave the above negro girl Anna, with her mate,
Stephens, called Sarah Margaret, of the name
Sarah Margaret and her heirs forever. The rest
of the above specified property, it is my will, up
on the death of my husband William T. Lawson, shall
be equally divided between my brother Alton L.
and son, Kenneth Jones and my sister Eliza Gayley
but I hereby nominate John Elliott Clegg Wilson
of Lawson and Hines Jones executors to this my
last will and testament. In witness whereof I have

W. John Howell, in presence of us, the subscribers, on the
twenty second day of March, in the year of our Lord eighteen
hundred and fourteen, being dangerously ill, and
every appearance, was, his end, which event did occur
in the morning of the same day, on being informed by
one of the subscribers of his danger, and asked if he had
so worldly anxiety, replied in the affirmative,
stating that he wished an instrument of writing,
signed by Major John Tracy, John Stevens, Oliver Stevens
and John Drury, which might contain the following
particulars, as respecting fully his affairs, and
being in his usual just and equitable, use, that all
the property obtained by the marriage of his wife
should revert to him, and all that he professed at that
time to go to his relatives. Written and witnessed
by us this twenty fourth day of March in the year
above written.
