Item 1st I leave my servant Harriet's three children, Frank, John and Shaba + + + + + after arriving to the age of fourteen years + + + + + to the Charity School in Savannah. John is to remain with Mr. Lydie Broughton five years, + + + + + Shaba will also be & remain with Mr. Lydie Broughton ten years.

Item 2^d. I leave my servants, Harriet and her child Abalom, and Betty the mother of Harriet, to my daughter Elizabeth Broughton, to her and her heirs forever.

Item 3^d. I bequeath and give to my sister Ann Baker my negro fellow March, to her and the heirs of her body forever.

Item 4th. I give to my brother Elijah Broughton my lot of land known by the name of Bull Island, and also my servant men Jacob to him and his heirs forever.

Item 5th. I leave a note of hand against Mr. Nathaniel Law (now in my possession), together with the rent of my Bull Island, for the support of my mother, but should she die before this money is appropriated to her use (which rent will amount to one hundred and fifty dollars), then all such money to be divided equally between Mrs. Ann Baker, Hester Liles, William and Robert Sallons. + + + + +

+ + + + + I leave Major A. Maybank my particular agent for in behalf of my mother, for the purpose of appropriating the money, as above stated, to her use in procuring necessaries for her. I Misses W. Way, of the County of Liberty and State aforesaid, planter, do hereby make my last will and testament. I wish all my lawful ^{debt} paid, and my negroes well fed and clothed. I leave my property in the care of my brother Thomas W. Way, and my utmost friends Joseph Bacon and Thos. W. Bacon, as executors to my will, in whose care I leave my property and business, to be managed according to their wisdom for the only use and benefit of my wife and children until they become of age to act for themselves; at which time they shall take possession of their part of the property, as I shall hereafter mention.

Item 1st I give and bequeath to my son Edmund Bacon Way the following negroes, viz. Will, Jacob, Jim, Marlborough, Luby, Betty and her children Nancy, Simon and Princes;

future sales and increase, together with the following tracts of land, to wit, a tract of land containing two hundred acres, more or less, in the County and State aforesaid, lying near the Altamaha Swamp, bounded Southerly by a tract of land belonging to Eugene Bacon, and on all other sides by vacant land when surveyed. Also another tract containing fourteen and a half acres in said County, bounded on the North by a tract of land belonging to Jos. L. McGowen, formerly Richard Norment on the East by W. H. Bacon, on the South by Estate Thomas Bacon and on the West by a tract of land owned by myself, which I purchased from Robt. I. Wheel. Also all the cattle in his mark. All the property included in the above items. To wit, Item 1st both personal and real, I give and bequeath to my son Edmund Bacon Way, to be his and at his disposal, at twenty one years of age.

Item 2^d The balance of my property, both personal and real, I leave to my wife Elizabeth and the children I now have, or may have by her, to be equally divided among them.

Item 3^d Each of my children shall claim the cattle which I have marked for them, and these cattle shall be considered as no part of my estate.
