I Samuel B. Law of Liberty County in the State of Georgia, considering the uncertainty of life, and being of sound mind and memory (for which I bless God) do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following, that is to say, First, I give and devise unto my beloved wife, Temperance Law, my house and lot in the town of Sunbury, with the appurtenances thereto belonging, and the rents, issues and profits thereof, for and during the term of her natural life; and from and after the decease of my said wife, I give and bequeath my said house and lot in the town of Sunbury unto such child or children as I shall have or have living at the time of my decease, and to their heirs and assigns forever. The above legacy given to my said wife as aforesaid, I hereby declare is intended to be, and is so given to her, in full satisfaction and recompence of and for her dower and thirds which she may or can in my wise claim or demand out of my estate.

Second, I give and bequeath unto my said wife a child's portion of my personal estate, and the issues and profits thereof, for and during the term of her natural life; and from and after the decease of my said wife, I give and bequeath said child's portion unto such child or children as I shall have or have living at the time of my decease, and to their heirs and assigns forever.

Third, I give and bequeath unto the Baptist Board of Foreign Missions this sum of one hundred dollars, to assist in the publication of the Burmese Bible.

Fourth, the rest and residue of my estate, both real and personal (not herein before by me given

and bequeathed) I wish to be equally divided between my children, share and share alike.
 Eighth. It is my will that no division of my estate shall take place, until all my just debts shall have been paid.

Ninth. It is my will that my executors shall have full power to dispose of any part of my estate, as the interests of the same may require, without the necessity of applying for leave to the Court.

Tenth. I hereby constitute and appoint my sons, Peter W. Fleming, Jacob S. Law and Joseph Law, the executors of this my last will and testament.
