Court of Ordinary, 4 January 1830.

The last will and testament of Sarah Stewart deceased, proved on the 19th October 1829 by the affidavit of Raymond Harris, was exhibited to the Court for examination. The Clerk requested the particular attention of the Court to the three first items in said instrument, expressing his doubts whether they did not tend in some degree to the manumission of the Slaves therein named.

Ordered, that the two first items in said instrument be disallowed of, and the third, together with the remainder of said instrument, be admitted to record.

Extract from the Minutes

B. Baker Clerk

October 5th 1829. Memorandum of the last will and testament of Mrs. Sarah Stewart, who being in sound mind, but unable to converse much, did declare the following.

3. Harry, carpenter, under control of same person [Charlton Hines], and to pay ten dollars per month, for the benefit of the Sunday School of Walthamville.
4. Sylvia and her three children I wish to be given to Mrs. Martha Elliott, her and her three children by Mr. John Elliott, with my particular request that she be ever treated with particular care and kindness.
5. I give Murrell to my niece Harriet H. Lewis, her and her heirs forever.
6. I give Boller to my niece Mary Eliza Lewis, to her and her heirs forever.
7. I give the girl Eliza to Ann Brasilla Lewis, her and her heirs forever.
8. I give the girl Lucy, to Caroline Lewis, to her and her heirs forever.
9. I give two hundred dollars, to be used in the purchase of a watch and chain, for my brother C. Hines.
10. I give Henry and Stephen, in trust to my brother Charlton, for the use and benefit of my brother David Hines during his natural life, and at his death to be sold, and divided among his children.
11. I give to my niece Eliza my chest of drawers & glass, & other appurtenances, now at Tranquil, together with my hexagon quilt.
12. All the other quilts to be equally divided among all the children of the late Samuel Lewis. I give each of the children of Saml. Lewis a bed and mattress.
13. All my plate I wish equally divided between my nieces Harriet and Eliza Lewis.
14. I give to my brother William, Lancaster, Arny, and her children Lancaster and Bence, the Affy and Hannah, to him and his heirs forever.
15. To my brother Charlton Hines, I give Jack and his brother London, to him, his heirs and assigns forever.
16. I give to Wm. J. May Young Plate, to him and his heirs forever.

17. I give to my niece Susan Russell and her children, Big Sylvia and her son Mike, and her infant.
18. All the residue of my estate, I leave to be taken in charge of my brother Charlton, to be worked by him, and the avails to be appropriated to benevolent and charitable objects.
19. I give my watch to my niece Harriet Lewis.

Judges of the Court of Ordinary for the County of Liberty in the State aforesaid in the
sum of six thousand dollars, to be paid to the said Judges, their Successors in office, or
assigns; for which payment, well and truly to be made and done, we bind ourselves jointly
and severally, and each of our heirs, executors and administrators, firmly by these presents,
sealed with our seals, and dated at Peachborough, the fourth day of January in the
year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty.

The Condition of the above obligation is such, that if the above bounden Moses
W. May and Eugene Bacon, administrators of the goods, chattels and credits of Thomas W.
Bacon, late of said County deceased, do make a true and perfect inventory of all and singular
the goods, chattels and credits of the said deceased, which have or shall come to the
hands, possession or knowledge of the said Moses W. and Eugene, or into the hands or possession of
any other person or persons for them, and the same, so made, do exhibit unto the said Court of
Ordinary when they shall be thereto required, and such goods, chattels and credits do well and
truly administer according to law, and make a just and true account of their doings and doings
