 heirs forever -

In the third place I give and bequeath to my son
 Henry Russell my Negro woman named Pegg to him and his
 heirs forever -

In the fourth place I give to his daughter my grandchild
 Sarah Eliza my Negro boy Joe - to her & her heirs forever

In the fifth place I give to my sons Edward W. Russell and
 Henry Russell in Trust for the use and benefit of my son
 James Russell my Negro woman Cecilia with the increase of
 her body for the use of the said James

In the sixth place I give to my grand daughter Ann Mary
 daughter of G. W. Walther Esquire - and his wife Mary - my
 Negro girl Phoebe to her and her heirs forever

In the last place it is my will and desire that at my
 death whatever money may have been due me by either
 of my sons Edward W. Russell or Henry Russell, never
