Memorandum made by Elijah Shultz this  
 3<sup>rd</sup> day of March 1799 that if I the said Shultz  
 should die without making a last will and testament.  
 It is my wish and I do hereby give unto my son  
 Elijah & Gibson Shultz my now felicitation to be  
 equally divided between them according to quantity  
 and quality except some small part I may hereafter  
 direct to be taken up. The tract of land now in dispute  
 between me and Wm on fishing Creek I give unto  
 Edmund Manger if he would together with two hundred  
 acres known by Shumann, all land on the river, if  
 this land should be measured by Wm the balance of  
 the tract he is to have which is two hundred acres lying low  
 and Shumann to have the rest.

together with two hundred acres of of the river tract and  
that the titles to the three different tracts are to be made  
to the said Edwin Mownger under the foregoing circum-  
stances.

I give unto Elijah Clarke the following Negroe boy to wife  
Randol, January 1<sup>st</sup> 1808.

I give unto Gibson Clarke the following Negroe servant  
Henry Pompey & Deborah, all my back lands and land in  
the low country I wish sold to the best advantage together  
with my land in Washington and Montgomery Counties,  
and the money arising therefrom to be appropriated toward  
the discharge of my debts and if after my debts are paid  
there should be a balance I wish it divided equally  
among my children. this I wish done as soon as possible  
I wish my Executors to sell the lands at private sale or other  
ways. and convey titles in any manner they may think  
most advantageous. All the remainder part of my  
Negroes I wish equally divided between my children at  
the decease of Mr. Clarke together with Stock &c.

I wish Mr. Clarke to stay on the Plantation with the Negroes  
until Elijah and Gibson Clarke comes of age at which  
time they are to receive their respective shares. and she  
is then to continue during her life if she chose the  
two hundred acres of land where Josiah Watton now lives  
into included in the division of Negroes at the death of Mr.  
Clarke. It is my wish that Elijah & Gibson Clarke may  
have liberal education and that the profits arising from  
the plantation and Negroes may be appropriated that  
may also wish Gibson to continue at school until  
he is two or three and twenty years of age my being incold  
at present may cause them in their prouess for  
a year or two but the profits arising from the plantation  
will make clearly clear itself.

I wish my son John Clarke, Benjamin Smith, Charles Williamson  
and Edwin Mownger to be my Executors to carry the  
foregoing memorandum completely into effect

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand

and seal this day & year first above written.

N.B. the tract of land belonging to the Mill or castle I wish not to be sold but that the Mill may be set in motion and kept up for the use of the family.

N.B. The tract of land I purchased of Shannon is not paid for. Payment is to be made for it out of bark lots, or some of them given in exchange.

There being some doubt suggested of the probability of carrying the foregoing Memorandum or will bearing date the third of March 1799. into effect in the opinion of its not being conformable to law. Now in order that it may be fully and completely complied with as the last will and testament of our deceased husband & father Mr. the heirs and relations do hereby readily give our assent to the same.

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I am Benjamin Smith to be raised out of the Negroes I have  
divided to be <sup>Equally</sup> divided amongst my children at the death  
of Mr. S. Clark. More than the rest on account of the Negroes  
originally given them not being equal in value to those  
given my other children. I also request and direct that my  
daughter Fanny Moulton return to Col. Williamson his bond  
and obligation given her for the purpose of obliging him  
to make her title to the tract of land on which I lived last  
year and I request and direct that Col. Williamson make the  
title aforesaid to Benjamin Smith instead of my daughter aforesaid.  
further I request that if any part of the six Negroes  
allotted by name to my sons Elijah & Eliz. Clark should die  
before the time fixed for their receiving them I wish the name  
of such deceased to be made up out of the negroes  
I have allotted to be divided amongst the whole of my  
children. further I request that a horse to the value of one  
hundred and fifty dollars be preserved by the sale of my  
back lands or other wise and be given to my daughter  
Fanny Moulton
