for all men to die And After death Judgement,
I do hereby constitute And Make this My Last
Will And Testament, In the Manner And form
as followeth, first I Commend My soul to God
that gave it And My Body to the Earth from Whence
It Was taken to be Buried In a Christian like
Manner, And As for What Worldly Goods It has
been pleased God to Bless Me With in this Life,
I leave And Bequeath to My dear And
Beloved Wife Mary Houghton
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First. I Give And Bequeath to My dear And
Beloved Wife Mary Houghton the part of my
Land Running Along from Peter Gullatt's
Corner down the Ridge fence Between me And
the said Gullatt. to my Corner, And Gullatt's
Corner on Joseph Griffins Spring Branch
And thence Along Joseph Griffins Line to Back-
sides Road And thence down the said Road
to John Rice line including my Building to
have a to hold During her Widowhood And If
she dont choose to keep the Land to live on She
may have Two Hundred Dollars paid to her by
the Twenty fifth day of December Next Which
Money She may have to do With As She thinks
proper — I Also Give My Wife a Child

part, of my Horse and cattle Sheep and Hogs & like
 with a Negro Man by the name of Sam to have
 And to hold as her own property, And After pay-
 ing the aforesaid debts out of the Money that I have
 now in hand And Notes And The Balance of
 My crop of Cotton now And After taking out Twenty
 Dollars which I give to my daughter Rachel Hugu-
 ley And Twenty Dollars to my daughter Polly =

Huguley And Twenty Dollars To my son George
 C. Huguley And fifteen Dollars To my daughter
 Huguley And the Balance of my Money And Notes
 that is now due And the Balance of my crop
 of Cotton now in hand After sold And paying of the
 above mentioned sums, My Wife I give A Childs
 part of the Balance of the Money to have as her
 own, I also give my Wife All her house hold &
 Litchen furniture, that was her own when I mar-
 ried her, And I also give her A part of her four
 children that was her own before marriage,

I also give my Wife the liberty of making this
 present crop - If She thinks proper, And I also
 give my son Charles Huguley & Jacob Huguley
 Liberty to Work in the crop, which each of them
 is to Receive One Thousand pounds of seed cotton
 for their Labour, And then my Wife is to have A
 Childs part of the crop of both of Wheat & cotton of
 fourteen, And if She thinks proper to make the
 crop, She is to keep the crop of both And fourteen
 that I have now in hand of My Bacon to feed the
 family, And if She does not choose to make the
 crop, She is only to have A Childs part of the
 present crop of both of Wheat & cotton of
 fourteen And I also give my Wife the balance
 of my Land that I hold After this crop my Wife
 own

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Man John & wife is to work and my son Charles
 Huguley & Jacob Huguley is to have a share in the
 property & able to the hands they work if they choose
 to work with them they are not to be behind of that,
 privilege but if there is more made then sup-
 ports my children, for my plantation it is to be
 equally divided between them that is today Charles
 Huguley, Jacob Huguley, Rachel & Huguley, Peter
 Huguley and George H. Huguley

Thirdly And lastly After the expiration
 of time for me in this date my land on the coast
 and All my household & kitchen furniture my
 stock & Thorns cattle & such a large of many is
 to be equally divided between my children that
 is to say, Charles Huguley, Jacob Huguley, Rachel
 Huguley, Peter Huguley, George H. Huguley,
 & such a large of many is to be equally divided
 between them that is to say Charles and Jacob Huguley
 that is Anna and Anne West. I give to the Rest
 of my children, I leave, John Huguley, Peter
 Gullatt. And I want some Executors of this
 my Last Will & Testament.
