

Last Will and Testament of

I, Louisa Ellen Collins, of said State and County
being of advanced age, and infirmed in body, but of sound and disposing mind
and memory, knowing that I must soon depart this life, deem it right and proper
that I should make a disposition of the property with which a kind Providence has
blessed me. I do therefore make this my last Will and Testament, ^{hereby} revoking and an-
nulling all others by me heretofore made.

First: I desire and direct that my body be buried in a Christian burial, as may be
suitable to my circumstances and condition in life; my soul, I trust, shall
return to rest with God, who gave it.

Second: I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid, without any
unnecessary delay, by my Executor hereinafter named and appointed.

Third: I give and bequeath and devise to my beloved daughter, Ann
Ellen Scott, wife of Mr. J. Scott, all my household and personal property, to-wit: one
wardrobe, two Cottage bedsteads, two feather beds and bedsteads, two
washstands, half dozen cane bottom chairs, one large cane rocking chair, one
split-bottom rocking chair, seven split-bottom chairs, one small mahogany
dining table, one small walnut table, three pine tables, one blue chest, seven
cane clocks, rocking more, glass cases, six silver teaspoons, one silver
sugar bowl, silver spoons, marked W. E. C. and all my clothes in action and
what ever may be due me from the estate of Mrs. M. Collins, my deceased
and whatever may accrue from any other source, and all of my property of
whatsoever kind, and I give, bequeath and devise to my said daughter,
Ann Scott, forever to be exempt from the debts of her present husband, the said
J. Scott, and not to be subject to his debts, liabilities and obligations, in any
manner whatsoever, nor to the debts, liabilities and obligations of any husband.
