

George I know all men by these presents that  
Meriwether County I David Williams being in feeble health  
but of sound mind, and taking into  
view the shortness of life and certainty of death do make this  
my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all others,

Item 1<sup>st</sup>. After all my just debts are paid I give to  
my well beloved wife Tabitha Williams all my Real Estates, doors  
bells and Kitchen furniture of every description, the best set of  
Blacksmiths Tools, her choice of Wagons and Harness. Those  
Mules or Horses as she may prefer, twenty five head of stock  
Hogs, Four Cows and Calves, One Yoke of Oxen and the following  
named negroes (viz) Big Isaac, Peter, Moses, Aggy, and Calista  
with all her children during the natural life of my said wife.  
Tabitha Williams and I further bequeath to my wife twelve  
months support for herself and Barn,

Item 2<sup>nd</sup>. The balance of my Personal property I desire shall  
be equally divided among my children as follows. To James  
P. Williams, John S. Williams, David R. Williams, Nathaniel  
W. Harman, Jonathan D. Williams, Plumer W. Williams,  
Anassa Williams and Mary J. Wisdom one equal share each  
and our share divided equally between my two Grand Children  
viz. David W. Spring & Emily R. Wisdom.

Item 3<sup>rd</sup>. It is my desire that the property both Real and  
Personal bequeath to my dear wife Tabitha Williams by the  
first Item of this instrument at her death shall be  
equally divided among my children in the manner named  
in the second Item by sale or otherwise.

Item 4<sup>th</sup>. I hereby constitute and appoint James P. Williams  
and John S. Williams my executors and in the event of their  
inability to act, it is my desire that Jonathan D. Williams &  
Plumer W. Williams may carry out the provisions of this my  
last Will and Testament.

I know all men by these presents that I John Milano  
of the County of Meriwether and State of Georgia being weak  
and of feeble health, but of sound mind and memory (thanks be to  
Almighty God,) and calling to mind the uncertainty of human  
life have thought proper to make publish and declare this my  
last Will & Testament in manner and form following, to wit,  
I will my soul to God who gave it and my body to be interred  
in decent Christian burial.

2<sup>d</sup> after paying all my just debts I will to my beloved  
wife Irene B. Milano & my Son Marshal Milo Milano and  
my daughter <sup>may appear</sup> Letitia Abith Milano all of my effects, goods and  
Chattels, Lands and Tenements, Stock of every description  
which I possess, also all of my Negroes being ten (10) in num-  
ber, together with their incancks as common Stock and as joint  
property will all remain as they are. But in the event  
of my aforesaid wife marrying again I will and recom-  
mend that all the above named property together with the incancks  
be divided into three equal lots as practicable and that  
my aforesaid beloved wife draw one third or one of the lots,  
and that the other two lots be thrown together as the joint legacy  
of my little son and daughter until one or both of them shall  
arrive at the age of twenty one years or become competent by  
law to take care of their joint legacy by an equal  
division.
