I, Nancy Johnson of the County of
Wilkes, being of perfect mind, and memory, but
knowing it to be appointed once for all persons to do
do make, order, and confirm this as my last will
and testament, hereby revoking all wills and testa-
ments heretofore made by me.

1st I commend my Soul to God, who gave it, and
to Christ its Redeemer, and my body after death
I will and request may be decently and substantially
buried.

2nd I will that all my just debts, be first paid out
of the interests and proceeds of my worldly property.

3rd I will that my beloved daughter Betsey Cunningham
have all a certain set of Blacksmiths Tools, belonging
and now used in my Shop in the County of Wilkes,
which set of Tools embrace an Anvil, Bell-
ows, Vice, Hammer &c. This is retained to her
special and exclusive use for the use of the family
only.

Cunningham, and Thomas Newby, Cunningham, have a certain plantation of land, in the County of Wilkes, the exact quantity in acres not known, but believed to be about one hundred and eighty. It is the place from whence their father Drury Cunningham removed, and lies adjoining Rodewick, McMill & others. To belong to them equally or the proceeds whenever they may choose to sell it.

5th I will, that Thomas Newby, Cunningham before mentioned, have a certain Horse named Charley, a Sorrel Horse in Colour, & well known in my family by that name.

6th I will, that my beloved grandchild John Meriwether Cunningham have a certain Sorrel mare also known in my family by the name of Sal mare.

7th I will, that my beloved grandchild Wiley Cunningham, his particular double name if any not recollected have a certain yoke of Oxen, which are upon my plantation in Wilkes County. I have three yoke of Oxen, and I mean for him to have the middle yoke, being not the oldest nor youngest.

8th I will, that my beloved grandchild John Pope Sprattlin have a certain Bay filly mare well known in my family and now on my plantation in the County of Wilkes.

9th I will, that my beloved grandchild Mary Ann Sprattlin have one feather bed.

10th I will, that my beloved grandchild Emily Sprattlin have one feather Bed.

11th I will, that my beloved grandchild Mary Ann Elizabeth Cunningham have one feather Bed.

12th I will, that my beloved grandchild John Pope Johnson have my youngest yoke of Oxen. Known on my plantation as such & by his claiming them.

13th I will, that my beloved grandchild William Wiley Hill have a certain Sorrel Horse known as Doves colt.

14th I will, that my beloved grandchild John Meriwether Hill have a certain horse also known on my plantation as Sal mares colt.

15th I will, that my beloved grandchild Isadora Hill

have one Feather Bed and first Choice Bedstead of my
House hold furniture, in the County of Wilkes.

10th I will that my beloved grandchild William Marshall Martin have two certain mules upon my plantation in Giles County, which are known as the jack mule and the one bought by me in the year 1837.

17th. I will that my beloved grandchild Martha Catherine Hill
have one Feather Bed.

11 I will, that my beloved son in law William D. Martin have my oldest & best of Men and Cart, known as such on my plantation aforesaid.

9th I will, that my beloved son-in-law George W. Chatfield have my plantation for four horses complete which are known upon my plantation aforesaid.

I will that my beloved daughter Fitty Ann. Chatfield have my four wheel carriage and two Horses the same as now drove and used by me therein; also one Chamber Bed; also my Carriage driver a negro man by the name of Lewis.

And I will, that my beloved Son-in-law, William, D. Mc-
partin, Esq. W. Chatfield, and Lodowick M. Hill as
three parts, and my daughter for herself and children
Betsey Cunningham for her and their support only
as one part, and my deceased daughter Mary, and
children as one part, do have, receive, and share
equally on the sale of all my Corn, Fodder, oats, cattle,
Hogs, and all other species of property belonging to me
individually and personally in the County of Wilkes
or else where, and which is not specially bequeathed
in this my last will and Testament.

Thereby appoint Adonwick M. Hill of the County
of Wilkes my sole Executor of my last
Will and testament with the hope and request that
will act & fulfill all my wishes & desires as therein expressed.

herein given to my daughter Betsey Cunningham and her children, is given to her and them exclusively for the support of the family, and not of right to her husband Drury Cunningham.
