Thirdly, I give bequeath and devise to my beloved wife Elizabeth Phillips, all my real and personal estate, that I may be possessed of at the time of my death, with all the rights, Members & Appurtenances to the same in anywise belonging for and during her natural life or widowhood, and at her Marriage or after her estate therein is over; I desire the property equally divided between my lawful heirs and my beloved wife Elizabeth Phillips, her having a child or part if she should marry.

Fourthly, I give bequeath and devise to my beloved Son Barton Dabner and my beloved Daughter Susan Amizoneer when they come to the years of Majority one Cow and Calf each, and one year bedstee and bedding each, I further give and bequeath to my beloved Son Laurence M. My Saddle, the amount of my estate that will be going to my beloved sons John A. & Samuel R. I desire equally distributed between the lawful heirs of my said sons, John A. unless they be personally present, at the time of the distribution. I further desire that the amount of my estate that will be due the widow of my deceased son Abram J. be equally divided between his lawful heirs at the time that my estate is distributed according to this will.

Fifthly, I hereby constitute and appoint my beloved ~~son~~ Laurence M. Yancey and my Son-in-law J. M. Johnston, Executors of this my last will and testament. This 4 day of November 1869, the word Samuel R. interlined before
