Hundred and thirty seven.

In the name of God - Amen... I Allen Congleton
of the county and state aforesaid, being in low state of health
but of sound mind, make and constitute this my last will
and testament. I commit my soul into the hands of God
and my body to the earth to be decently buried.

First I bequeath unto my wife Sarah Congleton during her
natural life or widowhood my negro man Lecharles and my
second. It is my request that my Executors should purchase
a settlement of land for my wife Sarah Congleton and my
children who is yet under age to live upon at the price or
sum of Three Thousand dollars, whenever my Executors may
think proper to select it.

Thirdly. It is my request that Lemmiza Congleton and Susan
Congleton should they not be disposed to receive their
proportional part of the estate should live with my wife
& younger children on the above described lands and be en-
titled privileges and interest that the younger children are.

Fourth. It is my request for all my negroes, that may not
be particularly given away together with all my house
hold and kitchen furniture with my stock of every des-
cription to be kept together on the above named lands
and controlled and managed to the best advantage by
my Executors for the use and benefit of my wife Sarah
Congleton and my children as above mentioned.

And that my children shall be boarded and schooled or educated from the proceedings of the same.

Fifth - It is my request that whenever any one of my children arrives at the age of twenty one or marries that they shall then be entitled to their proportionable part of all the estate the land only excepted

Sixth - It is my request that my daughter Artitia Congleton shall keep the negro woman Kitty and her increase at a fair and reasonable value, out of her proportionable part of my estate.

Seventh. It is my request that my son Thomas Jefferson Congleton shall be entitled to two hundred dollars more than any of my other children at this time and is two hundred dollars in addition to that at the death of my wife Sarah Congleton

Eighth. It is my request that at the death or widowhood of my wife Sarah Congleton that Charles a fellow and any and her in case she stands house hold furniture furniture stock of my description, together with the crop that may then be on hand be equally divided among all my children as above specified.

Ninth It is my request that my Executors take charge of all my notes of hand and collect them together with what money I have by me and after paying for the land as above named, will reserve the special Legacy of two hundred dollars to Thomas Jefferson Congleton and the balance shall be equally divided between my wife Sarah Congleton and all of my children together with my crop of cotton now in season and the one on hand and make a fair showing of their acts.

Tenth It is my request that Austin Congleton wife R. Congleton and James McQuinn act as my Executors and carry into effect the above clauses of this will.
