and memory do make publish and declare, this my last will and
testament hereby revoking all former wills by me at any time
made. My soul I commit to the hands of him from whom I
received it. My body I wish decently buried. And as to such property
as it hath pleased a kind Providence to bestow upon me I dispose
of in the following manner, viz,

First. I give & bequeath to my beloved wife Ann for and during
her natural life two negroes, Lee and Ritta, the land on which
I now live, the household and kitchen furniture, one horse and
waggon, two Cows & calves and twelve head of hog. After the
death of said named wife, the above mentioned property to be equally
divided between my two daughters Patsy, & Annilla for their
benefit during their natural life, and at their decease to be equally
divided between their children.

2^d Whereas I have heretofore given to John Hitt the husband of my
daughter Patsy fifty six acres of land with two hundred
Cows, one negro gal named Linda with one hundred
one man and saddle worth sixty dollars, one bed
furniture worth thirty dollars, one Cow calf whiper worth
dollars and one chest worth four dollars, and whereas I have
given to my daughter Annilla one bed & blanket worth thirty
dollars, one saddle worth fifteen dollars, one negro gal named
da worth five hundred dollars & also a set of two hundred
Cows paid Dr. Head for Lyons the husband of said Annilla
will wish and desire is, that all of the remainder of my property
real & personal which I may die possessed of shall at my decease
to all my just debts have been paid, from property which can
be spared) be equally divided between my said two daughters
& Annilla / subject to the Mortgage which I have heretofore
them & which is named above for their use & benefit during their
natural lives, and at the decease of either of my said
daughters the property owned from my estate shall
equally divided among and between the children of the

Item 5th I give and bequeath unto my wife Elizabeth Wood all the residue of my property not herein before disposed of Consisting of six negroes 1st a negro boy Stephen 2^d a boy Timothy 3^d a girl Elizabeth, 4th a girl Harriell 5th a boy John, and lastly a woman Phylly and all her future increase if any, also eighty acres of Land whereon I now reside with horses, stock, household and kitchen furniture to her forever to do as she pleases with after my death

I do desire that Wiley A. Jones & Hiram Thierice be and are hereby appointed my Executors to this my last will and Testament.
