Macon County I know all men by these presents that I Robert Lee & Elizabeth
 of said county & state being of sound mind and memory but in
 a low state of health but calling to mind the uncertainty of life and the
 certainty of death do ordain constitute and appoint this my last will and
 testament after recommending my soul to God & my body to the dust
 from whence it came & dispose of what worldly goods it hath placed God
 to bestow on me in the following manner viz.

In the first place of give unto my beloved wife Nancy C. Hiddlesteth
 the lot of land wherein I now live it being No. 84 in the 8th district
 of Macon County including all my buildings and property five acres part
 of Lots 11 & 12 and 78 in said county my district during her natural life
 and then to be equally divided between my three youngest children Albert,
 William Jackson and Eliza. Second I declare to my wife Nancy equal
 with my eldest children as regards land (and also your negroes, w. Long,
 Edmund, Sarah and Adams two horses, two cows & calves & twenty five head
 of stock hogs all of her own choosing, all the household and kitchen
 furniture and one equal share of all the ready money that may then be
 had at any time Monroe County Georgia will 1824-1837 is to be sold at her death
 and the money equally divided among all of my heirs except the
 & land above mentioned

10th I give unto the church of James Warren my only daughter Sarah
Blairnow one negro girl named Lula.
3rd To Tallot S Middlebrooks our negro boy named Peter.
4th To my daughter in law Mary Middlebrooks wife of my son Thomas
Middlebrooks Esq and the law holder of this body. two hundred dollars
to be equally divided between them between them shall any share
5th To Alison Davis my daughter in law one negro girl Sophia.
6th To Alfred Middlebrooks our negro boy Lewis.
7th To John W Simmons a negro girl Lucy
8th Eliza Clark Middlebrooks a negro girl Harriet.
9th Albert Middlebrooks a negro boy Allen.
10th To my son William Jackson Middlebrooks a negro boy Alexander.
My will further is that my three youngest children should receive out
of the proceeds of the sale of my personal property the value of
one horse, cow and calf, bedding furniture and one carriage & gear to
make them equal with my children that has married off
in that line of property.
11th And furthermore at my decease all of my property both real
(and) personal not mentioned in this will be sold at a credit of
twelve months (and) after paying all of my just debts the proceeds
to be equally divided among my heirs according to the terms of
this my will.
12th My desire is that my wife should have one year possession
at apart by my executors for her support.
I do hereby ordain, constitute (and) appoint Alfred Middlebrooks
(and) John W Simmons my executors to carry this my will into effect
according to law (and) equity.
