I William Hogan at this time being in an imperfect state of health, but of sound mind and memory do (this the seventeenth day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and five) (call to mind) that of mortality knowing that I must shortly give up this mortal body to God, to whom it belongs. I do now take into consideration that of my worldly possessions and do desire the disposal of them according to this my last will and testament as follows— First— I give my body to the earth, and secondly, my soul to God from whom it came not doubting but that he will do all things with me, and

Thirdly— I desire that all my debts be paid together with my funeral expenses— I do also desire that my daughter Elizabeth, Wierford and Susan, Hogan's share each dollar each to make them equal to my son James and Thomas Hogan. I also desire that my son Arriagual and William Hogan have sixty dollars each likewise when at age. I also desire that my beloved wife Nancy Hogan have the possession of my whole estate real and personal during her widowhood— and that it be in her power to give to such of my children as they come of any such a part or parcel of money or property as she thinks that can be spared without destroying the interest of the other legatee. I also desire that the tract of land I am now in the possession of be equally divided between my two youngest children at the decease of my beloved wife; then I desire that all I now have & that may arise from the profits of said estate be equally divided between all my children excepting one hundred dollars that I give to Arthur Dillard to be made out of my estate; any part made by a legatee at any time is so struck off their part.

I also constitute and appoint my beloved friend Arthur Dillard executor and my beloved wife executrix to execute this my last will & testament.

Item 1st To my beloved wife Mary Johnson I hereby give a
negro man manifes, a negro girl minnie, and seven
and fifty dollars in money to be raised
as hereinafter directed which money is to be laid out in the
purchase of land for the use of my wife and the family
she may have it is also my will, that my wife have all
the household and kitchen furniture, together with the value
stock of sheep, horses, cattle, plantation tools & with the
exception of that part of the same hereinafter disposed

of
Item 2^d To my oldest son William Johnson I give a
negro boy by name of Bert, which he has already in possession
I have already given him money which will make his
share equal to the share I shall give to my other
children.

Item 3^d To my beloved daughter Louisa Long I do give
a negro woman by the name of Rachel, and a negro
girl Mary which she has in her possession these negroes
together with money and other things which she has need
there equal to what I give to my other children.

Item 4th To my beloved daughter Martha Brown I hereby give
a negro woman Rhoda, and a negro girl Grace and a
boy by the name of George, together with other things which
she has need make her share equal to what I give to my other chil-
dren.

Item 5th To my beloved son Thomas Johnson I do hereby
