Mrs Anna Davie's Will

State of Georgia Muscogee County

I, Anna Davie, being of sound and disposing mind and memory do make this my last will and testament of all my worldly affairs hereby revoking all other wills by me ever made

Item 1^d I wish my body to be decently buried by my children and relatives in such manner as they may see fit. My immortal spirit to God who gave it relying upon his goodness and mercy

Item 2^d I will that all my just debts be paid

Item 3^d I give to my son Pleasant G. Phillips one Bedstead, Bed & Bedding out of that I now have on hand, and two Bonds with Coupons annexed, on the Mobile and Girard Rail Road of Alabama guaranteed by the Central Rail Road and Banking Company of the State of Georgia, the principal amount of each called for one Thous and Dollars. No One Hundred and Twenty Seven (127) and One Hundred and Twenty Eight (128), Also a Bond at One Hundred and Sixty Six (166) of the City of Columbus Georgia issued to the North and South Rail Road of the State of Georgia for One

Item 4th I give to my Grand Daughter Mrs Eugenia Flounoy a Bond of the City of Columbus Georgia issued to the North and South Rail Road of Georgia for One Thousand Dollars with the coupons therewith annexed at One Hundred and Sixty seven (167) and the balance of my Bedding also I give my Trunks and Clothing to her to distribute or not as she thinks fit between herself and her sisters -

Item 5th I give to my Grand Son Charles J. Moffett the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for his kind attention to me when sick etc.

Item 5th I give to each of my Sons Abram and George Phillips the sum of One Thousand Dollars, and each of my Grand Sons to wit Gedell and George W. Davis the sum of Five Hundred Dollars, first, then I give to my Sons Abram Phillips and George Phillips, and the Children of my deceased daughters to wit Elizabeth Crews Dorinda W. Moffett and Sarah A. Davie the residue of my Estate principally comprised in an interest in an Execution against Western, L. and Montgomery, J. Davie of Christian County Kentucky the evidence of which I hold. The Children of the before mentioned deceased daughters, to draw what would be each of their Mothers proportionate share of this fund between them & their brothers mentioned

Item 6th That portion of my Estate which I have given to my son Pleasant J. Phillips, is for, and to him alone, which he is to have, hold and enjoy without let or hindrance for and during his natural life, and if he dies without legal issue, child or children at his death, it is to be equally divided between his surviving Brothers and the Children of my deceased daughters each set of Children to draw what would be their Mothers portion if they were all in life.

Item 7th It will be apparent from this Will that I have done more for my son Pleasant J. Phillips and my Grand daughter Eugenia Flounoy than I have for others bearing the same relationship to me that they do, which thing I do knowingly and on purpose not as a rebuke or reflection on others similarly related but as compensation and reward to him for doing and taking care of me.

I nominate and appoint my two sons Pleasant J. Phillips of Georgia and George A. Phillips of Texas as my Executors, to carry this my Will into effect said Pleasant J. Phillips to mind up and distribute what I have in Georgia and Alabama and George A. to collect and distribute what may be due me in Kentucky but this
