delay, by my Executor and Executrix hereinafter named,  
as I am unwilling my creditors should be delayed of  
their rights especially as there is no necessity for delay.

Item 2<sup>nd</sup>

I give and devise to my beloved wife Malinda lot of  
Land number Two hundred and four (204) Containing  
One hundred and forty acres. Part of lot number  
189 Containing Eighty two acres (82) Lot of land number  
One hundred and Ninety (90) Containing two hundred  
two and half acres more less (202 1/2) Part of lot number  
One hundred and eighty nine (189) Containing Seventy Six  
acres (76) With all the rights members and Appertaining  
to said Lots of Land. Containing five hundred (500) acres  
in any wise appertaining or Belonging free from all charge  
or limitation whatever, to her own proper uses benefit dur-  
ing her natural life I also give and bequeath to my wife  
in the same unreserved manner. the farming utensils  
used on and belonging to said plantation of every  
description, whatever, and four mules and three cows  
and calves and nine head of Hogs and one yoke of Oxen  
and three yearlings. All my house hold and Kitchen furniture  
belonging to said plantation. Two Buggy's all without  
reserve or limitation.

## Ellen Edwards emancipative Will

State of Georgia Muscogee County

Mr Robert L. Bass, Margaret Ann Bass and Eliza Turner were present on Saturday the 22<sup>nd</sup> twenty Second of July 1876, at the residence of Ellen Edwards, a single woman; whose residence was used and occupied by her in the County and State aforesaid, and the said Ellen Edwards on the day aforesaid during her last sickness from which she expired on the 30<sup>th</sup> day of July next following thereafter and then and there believing herself about to die, in the full knowledge of her condition and perfect possession of her mental faculties called upon us to take notice and remember what she was about to say and see that her last wishes were complied with whereupon she stated: that her will and desire was to be decently buried, such in a common and cheap way, but nicely and respectably and that having no relatives on Earth, her will and desire was after the payment of her funeral expenses and her debts that all of her property including her personal effects, and her residence, should be given to Sallie Franklin who was so good a friend to her and had nursed her so kindly in her illness. The said Ellen Edwards repeated to us three several times her will and desire as above set forth, impressing the same upon us as her last wishes and her desire that they should be fully carried out. In witness of the truth whereof we have hereunto set our hands this third 3<sup>rd</sup> day of August 1876.
