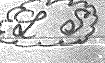

I George White Senior of said State & County make this my last will and testament hereby revoking and annulling all others heretofore made by me.

Item 1st I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay, by my Executor and Executors hereinafter named, as I am unwilling my creditors should be delayed of their rights especially as there is no necessity for delay

Item 2nd I give and devise to my beloved wife Malinda lot of Land number Two hundred and four (204) Containing one hundred and forty acres. Part of lot number 189 Containing Eighty two acres (82) Lot of land number one hundred and ninety (190) Containing two hundred two and half acres more or less (202 1/2) Part of lot number one hundred and eighty nine (189) Containing Seventy Six acres (76) With all the rights members and appurtenances to said Lots of land, containing five hundred (500) acres in any wise appertaining or belonging free from all charge or limitation whatever to her own proper use, benefit during her natural life I also give and bequeath to my wife in the same unreserved manner, the farming utensils used on and belonging to said plantation of every description, whatever, and four mules and three cows and calves and nine head of Hogs, and one yoke of oxen and three yearlings, all my household and kitchen furniture belonging to said plantation, Two Buggys all without reserve or limitation.

Item 3rd I constitute and appoint my beloved wife Malinda White Executrix and my Son Abner W. White Executor to this my last will and testament this May 25th 1876

Ellen Edwards Nuncupative Will

State of Georgia Muscogee County

We Robert L. Bass, Margaret Ann Bass and Eliza Turner were present on Saturday the 22nd twenty Second of July 1876, at the residence of Ellen Edwards, a Single Woman; which residence was used and occupied by her in the County and State aforesaid, and the said Ellen Edwards on the day aforesaid during her last sickness from which she expired on the 30th day of July next following thereafter and then and there believing herself about to die, in the full knowledge of her condition and perfect possession of her mental faculties she called upon us to take notice and remember what she was about to say, and see that her last wishes were complied with, where upon she stated: that her will and desire was to be decently buried, not in a common and cheap way, but nicely and respectably and that having no relatives on Earth, her will and desire was after the payment of her funeral Expenses and her debts that all of her property including her personal Effects, and her residence, should be given to Sallie Franklin who was so good a friend to her and had nursed her so kindly in her illness. The said Ellen Edwards repeated to us three several times, her will and desire as above set forth, impressing the same upon us as her last wishes and her desire that they should be fully carried out. In witness of the truth whereof we have hereunto set our hands this third & 2nd day of August 1876.
