I, Hannah Tucker of said County and State being full in body but sound in mind and discretion, and knowing the uncertainty of life, do hereby make, publish and declare the following as my last will and testament, hereby revoking all others by me heretofore made

Item 1<sup>st</sup>

I will first, that having committed my Soul to God the giver of all good, that my body be decently buried and that all my just debts be immediately paid -

Item 2<sup>d</sup>

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Lucinda Young one Gold Watch, and all the Bedding and Furniture, and all Household goods that I may own and in my possession at my death

## Hannah. Tuckers. Will Continued

to have and to hold to her own use and benefit, free of any debt or contract of her husbands and after her death to her heirs and assigns forever

Item 3<sup>d</sup> I give and devise unto my daughters Lucinda Young and Martha Wright all my real Estate consisting of a tract or parcel of land situate lying and being in said County and State in the Sixth District containing Eighteen acres more or less being a fractional part of lot numbers One Hundred and Sixty One & Two (161 & 162) & One Hundred and Ninety one (191) together in equal parts, excluding all other heirs and persons whomsoever from a participation in said property, and to these and after their death to their heirs and assigns forever, free from all the debts or contracts of their Husbands
