State of Georgia In the name of God, Amen, I resign my body to the dust  
Upson County and my spirit to God, who gave it  
3rd I am a going to take a trip to the Western Country, and in  
my fortieth year, and nor of sound and disposing mind, and wish to leave a Will for  
the mutual benefit for my beloved wife and little children. I now consider it the appropriate  
time to make it.

First - I wish my farm property sold. my Farm sold, and all my Notes and Accou'ts  
Collected, and all of my just debts paid, which will not exceed 700 dollars, except the  
law suit now pending for my boy George, which I trust my Atty's and Executors  
will see my wife and Children righted. After selling my farm property and Farm and  
Collecting my dues, and the just debts paid, I want my wife to pick out her a Farm  
in any County she may desire, to contain some 2 or 300 acres of land. I want it paid  
for out of the general fund, and if there be any left, I wish her, and my other Executor  
to buy such lands as they think best.

I want my wife to keep all my children together, and educate, clothe, and raise them all  
out of the Common fund, and as they marry off, I wish them to have a good horse  
and 100 dollars laid out by the Executors in Furniture, such as chairs, bedsteads -  
Groceries &c. - I wish my beloved wife to keep all of my other property with  
her until my youngest child comes of age, except she marries her second husband, if  
so, I give to her a Childs part of all my property, her natural life, and at her  
death it to go back to my children then living, and at her marriage I want all my  
property to be taken into the hands of my Executor, and as my children become of age  
or marry I want the whole to be valued and for he or she, as the case may be to draw  
out their equal share. The residue to remain in Common until the next arrives as before.

I appoint my dear wife, and my dear brother Isaac Cheney  
of Talbot County my lawful Executors to take charge of my property without bond  
or security, or any administration or any sale, only as they both may think best. If  
my beloved wife marries I dismiss her from the Executordship only over her own part  
and that only for her natural life, and desire my named brother to manage for  
my Orphan Children to the best advantage, but if my beloved wife never marries  
I want her to hold all my property except the dower at the marriage of my  
children, as long as she may live or until the youngest child becomes of age, then may  
then give off to each one as much as she may think best for them, and to hold the  
rest in reserve for her own use her natural life, but in every instance it is to be  
given off in equal proportions to all of my children then living, if any of my children  
should die without bodily issue their property and its increase to come back to the  
rest of my children then living. - My son William I have done a great deal for  
and I hope you will become steady, and take care of your mother and your little brothers  
and sisters. - May God bless my wife and little children, and protect them through  
this sinful world. - My request is if I die in the west, let me remain there - When  
this you see, remember me, - When greedy worms my body eats, here that you can  
read my name complete. - (Farewell)
