For the purpose of carrying this will into effect I appoint my trusted Son in law James Boy Slade my Executor without requiring him to give Bond and Security. Witness my hand and seal this 1<sup>st</sup> day of July 1888.

## William D Lynch's Will

State of Georgia } In the name of God Amen.

Muscogee County } I William D. Lynch of said County and State  
being of sound and disposing mind and memory  
but being advanced in years and knowing the uncertainty of  
life and the certainty of death, feel that it is during my  
life to make a disposition of the property which a kind Provi-  
dence has blessed me with, do hereby make, publish and declare  
this to be my last will and testament hereby revoking and an-  
nulling all other wills by me heretofore made.

Item 1<sup>st</sup>. It is my will and desire that I be buried in a decent and  
Christian like manner, suitable to my condition & circumstances.  
My soul I trust shall return to God who gave it, as I hope for eternal  
salvation through the merits and atonement of the Blessed Lord  
and Savior Jesus Christ, whose Religion I profess.

Item 2<sup>nd</sup>. It is my desire and I so direct that all my just debts be  
paid, as soon after my death as practicable, if the same can  
be done without being detrimental or injurious to the interest  
of my Estate.

Item 3<sup>rd</sup>. I give bequeath and devise to my Grand son Ulysses Lynch  
one Feather bed and furniture attached to the same to be  
selected by his Grand mother if alive at the time of my death,  
if not to make the selection himself.

Item 4<sup>th</sup>. I give, bequeath, and devise, to my beloved wife Frances  
A. Lynch, the place where I now reside, containing 20 2/3 acres  
more or less, together with all the appurtenances thereto be-  
longing, together with all the personal property which may  
be on said place at the time of my death, and now consisting  
of Hogs, cattle, one mule named Crockett, one Horse named  
Jack, Buggy and harness, wagon, Yoke Oven &c. And also  
all the Household and Kitchen furniture, (except the Bed  
and furniture heretofore bequeathed to my Grand Son) that  
may be on said premises at the time of my death, as well
