Joseph E. Webster's Will

State of Georgia Muscogee County

I, Joseph E. Webster of the State and County aforesaid, being advanced in years, and feeble in body, though of sound and disposing memory & mind, do hereby make, declare and publish this to be my last will and testament.

That is to say, I give and devise all Estate both real and personal to my wife Caroline E. Webster of the State and County aforesaid, and to my son Winfield S. Webster of the County of Fulton in said State, and to my daughter Harriet S. Barfield of the County of Bibb in said State, to have and to hold the same to themselves, their heirs and assigns forever, upon the trusts following, namely,

First To hold all my real estate in Columbus Georgia together & intact, until ten years after my death, and should my wife survive me more than ten years after my death, it is to be held together during her natural life.

Second I intend to pay all my lawful and just debts

Third Immediately after my death to pay to my son Winfield S. Webster of the County of Fulton in said State the sum of Four Thousand dollars, \$4000. I have heretofore given each of my daughters in property and money at various times about Four Thousand dollars, \$4000 each as advancements and the payment of this bequest to my son will place all of my children on an equal footing as regards all advancements.

Fourth To invest in some safe manner as may be deemed best by my trustees aforesaid, the sum of Two Thousand dollars, \$2000. One thousand dollars, \$1000 for each of my two Grand sons, Joseph M. & Samuel B. Palmer Children of Francis M. Palmer of Bibb County in said State. The interest, revenues and income derived from said investment, to be paid over half yearly to said Francis M. Palmer, mother of said children, for their education and

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support, during their minority, and on the attainment of majority by either of said children, the one half of said investment is to be turned over to the child first attaining majority, the other half to be turned over to the other child upon his attaining his majority. Should either of said children die before attaining majority, the whole of the interest, revenue and income derived from said investment, is to be appropriated to the benefit of the survivor, in manner and for the purpose aforesaid. And on the attainment of majority by the survivor the whole investment of Two Thousand dollars, \$2000.00 is to be turned over to said survivor.

In case both of said children should die during their minority then the whole of the investment of Two Thousand dollars, \$2000.00 is to be turned over to Francis W. Palmer, mother of said children, for her sole use & benefit. Should said Francis W. Palmer die before either one or both of said children attain majority, in that case, my said Trustees as hereby appointed Guardians of said minor child or children, during minority.

Fifth

It is my desire, that as soon as a good opportunity occurs & prices of Real Estate will justify, that my said Trustees dispose of all my Real Estate, on the Corner of Oak & Third Street in the City of Macon for the purpose of improving and erecting a two story Brick Building on my Real Estate in the City of Columbus, on the corner of Broad & Dillingham Street, and in addition I direct that all my notes, accounts, Public securities and all other evidences of debt to me payable, be set apart & kept as a fund for the purpose of the improvement of the aforesaid mentioned property.

This is not intended to include any of the Rents or income arising from my real estate in the City of Columbus, and as disposed of in another manner.

Sixth

I give to my wife Caroline E. Webster, the one third of the net income of my estate, to be paid over promptly on the first days of January & July, in the years during her natural life, which is in lieu of all right of Dower in my Estate. The other two thirds of the net income of my Estate is to be divided equally, share and share alike, between my son Winfield and my daughters Georgian & E. Webster, Harriet S. Barfield and Francis M. Palmer, on the first days of January & July in each year during the life of my wife, after first having on these days paid over to my wife her one third of the net income of my estate and no otherwise.

Seventh

Should any of my children die before my wife, and have lawful issue, such issue is to receive the parents share of the half yearly net income of my estate, but if any of my children should die before my wife leaving ^{lawful} no issue, then in that case, the half yearly net income of my estate, shall be divided, by giving one third to my wife and the other two thirds to my surviving children share and share alike.

Eighth

I give and bequeath to my wife all my wearing Apparel Beds, Bedding, Household and Kitchen Furniture to dispose of as she may choose.

Ninth

And I do hereby constitute and appoint my said Trustees
