I C. B. Talianferro do make the following last will & testament.

Item 1st I give to my wife Mildred B. the entire lot or lots now occupied by me as my residence in the City of Columbus for and during her life, and at her death to become the property of my daughter Lucy M. Wooten and her children and this item embraces all the household furniture, Horse & Buggy and all personal property now on said premises

Item 2nd I give to my daughter in law Lucy M. Talianferro, during her widowhood the house and lot now occupied by her and known as the Mims Corner lot in the City of Columbus, the same being intended as a home for her and her children as long as she remains a widow, and in case she remains single during her life, intending it as a home for her and children, and at her death or marriage, then to become the property of her children, share & share alike. And also upon the same terms as the above, I give the house and lot on Mercer Street in Columbus, now rented out by J. Turner as agent. And also on the same terms I give what is known as the Woods lot, with two tenement houses in the City of Columbus. Numbered as follows

Item 3rd I give jointly to William M. Boyles & J. S. Weatherly my plantation in Russell County Ala. known as the Wagon place in equal shares during their lives, and at their death to go to the children of them as may be living at their death or the death of either, and further the said William M. Boyles is now indebted to me in the sum of about Eight Hundred Dollars and that amount I give to Minnie M. Boyles daughter of Wm. M. Boyles

and my Executors are authorized to see that this is accomplished before he becomes of age or marries.

Item 4th I give to William Merriweather & J. S. Weatherly, jointly my plantation in Macon County Ala. Known as my Cotton Valley place, now in possession of J. P. Leary under Lease till January next, to them during their natural lives, and as said Weatherly is embarrassed, he has authority to sell his half interest in said place at any time, and the one half given to Merriweather is to go to Mary B. & her children at his death.

Item 5th I give to my son Dr. V. H. Taliaferro all that farm in Muscogee County Ga. Known as the Tom Reese place, situated some 6 or eight miles above Columbus, to him & his heirs forever.

Item 6th The plantation in Muscogee County, Known as the Andrews place I have bargained away to one Henry Evans in three payments, if he pays for it the proceeds are given to my wife, and if not paid for them I give the same to my wife to dispose of as she pleases, And also I give to my wife all that house and lot in Salem in Lee County Ala. Now occupied by Mr. Evans, rents being collected by Keenan Bros. to her absolutely to dispose of as she pleases.

Item 7th I have a block of tenements in Columbus running from McIntosh to Forsyth streets being Six in number, now controlled by Dr. Turner as agent Numbers not recollected, All these tenements I give to my wife for life and at her death to go jointly to V. H. Taliaferro & J. S. Weatherly to dispose of as they please.

Item 8th I own three tenements between Mercer and McIntosh streets in Columbus these I give to my daughter Mrs. Boyles for her life and at her death to go to her children.

I constitute and appoint V. H. Taliaferro & M. C. Houston Executors of this Will

Item First

I give and bequeath all my estate of whatever kind and character it may be unto my two daughters Margaret and Isabella now living in Scotland, To have and to hold in equal shares unto them, their heirs and assigns forever, as a separate estate

Item Second

I nominate and appoint my friend William H. Brannan of Columbus Georgia, to be the Executor of this will. I authorize him to sell and dispose of any part, or the whole of my estate, which may be necessary for the purpose of distribution or otherwise at his discretion, and at either public or private sale as he may deem best. I authorize and empower him in settling up my estate and receiving the same until distribution is made in the same manner as he would manage his own property, giving him full discretion in investing and changing investments, loaning and collecting money, and in the general management of the same. And I excuse him from giving any bond as such Executor

Joseph E. Webster's Will

State of Georgia Muscogee County

I, Joseph E. Webster, of the State and County aforesaid, being advanced in years, and feeble in body, though of sound and disposing memory & mind, do hereby make, declare and publish this to be my last will and testament.

That is to say, I give and devise all Estate both real and personal to my wife Caroline E. Webster of the State and County aforesaid, and to my son Winfield S. Webster of the County of Fulton in said State, and to my daughter Harriet S. Fairfield of the County of Bibb in said State, to have and to hold the same to themselves, their heirs and assigns forever, upon the trusts following, namely,

First

To hold all my real estate in Columbus Georgia together & intact, until ten years after my death, and should my wife survive me more than ten years after my death, it is to be held together during her natural life.

Second

In trust to pay all my lawful and just debts

Third

Immediately after my death to pay to my son Winfield S. Webster of the County of Fulton in said State the sum of Four Thousand Dollars, \$4000. I have heretofore given each of my daughters in property and money at various times about Four Thousand Dollars, \$4000 each as advancements and the payment of this bequest to my son, will place all of my children on an equal footing as regards all advancements.

Fourth

To invest in some safe manner as may be deemed best by my trustees aforesaid, the sum of Two Thousand Dollars, \$2000. One thousand dollars \$1000 for each of my two Grand sons, Joseph M. & Samuel B. Palmer Children of Francis M. Palmer of Bibb County in said State. The interest, revenues and income derived from said investment, to be paid over half yearly to said Francis M. Palmer, mother of said children for their education and
