Thomas Camak's Will

In the name of God Amen -

I Thomas Camak of the County of Muscogee & State of Georgia being
 of sound and disposing mind and memory and being desirous to set
 the my worldly affairs while I have strength so to do make & publish
 this my last will & testament.

And first I commit my soul to God who gave it and my body
 I desire to be buried by the side of my children in the cemetery in
 Columbus Georgia and my worldly estate I dispose of as follows

First I desire my debts to be paid particularly do I desire that
 my brother James Camak should be reimbursed for the money he ad-
 vanced to assist me in rebuilding the Alabama Mass House.

Second I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Laura A. Camak
 and her child or children should there be any all property of every
 kind that I may die possessed of to have & hold during the term
 of her natural life Should she die without heirs of my body
 I desire that my property should be divided equally between my
 Mattie Helen I Camak & my brother James Camak of the County of
 Clark - With this exception if there should be any property inherited
 from my wife's father Thomas Ragland I leave it altogether at her
 disposal In witness whereof I the said Thomas Camak to this my will
 have set my hand & seal this 28th day of March 1862

The State of Georgia

Harris County I Clement Pace of said County being feeble in body but sound in mind & discretion and knowing the uncertainty of do hereby make public & declare the following as my last will & testament hereby revoking all others by me heretofore made

I will first that having committed my soul to God the giver of all good that my body be decently buried & that all my just debts be immediately paid

I give unto my wife Mary Pace the following negroes to wit Thom, Old Ned, Sam, Berta, Caroline & her two children to wit Eliza Ann & Martha, Mary Jane & her five children to wit Richard, Mary, Anna, Mally and Gabriel & Maria's
