

I, John Turner, of said State and County, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking any and all former wills by me heretofore made.

Item I.

Having always had an abiding belief in God as my maker, and his son Jesus Christ, as my Redeemer, it is my desire and will that my body be buried in a Christian-like manner, the place and details to be determined by my wife.

Item II.

It is my will and desire that all of my just debts be paid as soon as practicable after my death by my executrix hereinafter named.

Item III.

I will, devise and bequeath to my dear wife, Ellen Turner, the house and lot whereon we now reside, and located on the public road leading from Fort Valley to Marshallville and known as South Mason Street; also one Star automobile (on which there is due \$210.00, which

she is to pay) and all of my household goods; also a store house and lot located on East Church Street in the City of Fort Valley, Peach County, Georgia. I also devise, will and bequeath to my said wife, Ellen Turner, all of the stock of goods in that certain store house on East Church Street, also known as Griffin Line, in said city of Fort Valley;-- all of the above devised property to be hers absolutely and in fee simple forever.

Item IV.

I also own a certain lot or tract of land located on East Church Street, or what is known as Griffin Line, which said property fronts on said East Church Street a distance of one hundred (100) feet, and runs back North in even width of said 100 feet a distance of two hundred (200) feet, and on which is located two 4-room dwelling houses, one 3-room dwelling house and one store house; and it is my will and desire, and I do hereby devise and bequeath to my daughter, Mary E. Gilbert, the west one-half of said lot, or the west fifty (50) by two hundred (200) feet depth portion of said lot, on which there is a four-room dwelling; and I do hereby devise and bequeath to my son Arthur Turner the East one half of said lot, the same fronting fifty (50) feet on East Church Street and running back in even width of said fifty (50) feet a distance of two hundred (200) feet, on which there is a store house (the stock of goods which I have bequeathed to my wife, Ellen Turner)- a three-room dwelling and also a four-room dwelling, which last named dwelling is partly located on that portion of the lot bequeathed to my daughter, Mary E. Gilbert; but my son Arthur Turner has the right, at his expense, to move said house over to and on his part of the lot within one year after my demise, or in event he does not, then after the expiration of one year, my daughter Mary E. Gilbert has the right, at her expense, to move said house to the portion of said lot herein conveyed to her and to be hers absolutely. Should my said son, Arthur Turner, move said house on his part of said lot within one year after my death, the same to be his absolutely.

Item V.

The provision made in Item III of this my will, for my wife, Ellen Turner, is in lieu of her yearly support and all other claims against my estate.

Item VI.

I hereby make and constitute my wife, Ellen Turner, as Executrix of this my last will and testament, and she is expressly relieved of making any inventory of my estate, or any account or from giving any bond to any court for her actings and doings as my Executrix. She is also specifically relieved from making any annual or final returns of her acts as my Executrix to any court whatever; the only requirement of her coming into full possession of all my personal property, and the house and lot on which we now reside, and the store house on Pine Street, being the payment of my debts and the probate of this my last will and testament in common form.
