CHIEF JUSTICE's CHARGE to the Grand Jury in Richmond county, at March Term laft,

Gentlemen of the Grand Jury,

70U are now convened to exercise a power. Y without the intervention of which, the penat laws of the flate cannot have an efficient operation in this county. It is your duty to prefent, as far as comes to your knowledge, offenders against the laws of every denomination; a neglect in this particular makes void the law. Its terror, and therefore its best use, is no more : It is the sentiment of an ingenious writer, "That crimes are more effectually prefented by the certainty, than by the feverity of punishment."

Virtue in the citizens is the foundation on which a republican government must rest; destroy that foundation, and the fair fabric of freedom muft fall. It is therefore your indispensable duty, to discourage every species of vice. Gaming tends more to corrupt the morals of a people, than any other in the black catalogue; it renders men felfifh, dishonest, and dishonorable; a gamester, a friend to no man, is a bitter enemy to himfelf.

Tipling houses, and unlicensed taverns, are not only a public nuisance, but actually deprive the flate of a confiderable revenue; to prevent fuch evil practices, and to encrease the public funds, is matter worthy your ferious attention.

The necessity of a speedy and punctual payment of taxes into the public treasury encreases daily. Your vicinity to the feat of government, has rendered information fo easy, that any further comment on this head would be ufelefs. The tax law of this year will be laid before you, and I have no doubt, but it will meet every facility necessary on

Our conflitution from experience has been found defective, in confequence of which, an alteration has been unanimously recommended by the Legislature; your approbation of fo falutary a measure

will tend greatly to promote it.

The profperous and improved flate of your county academy must afford the most pleasing sensations to every friend of feience, morality or government; but as that inflitution is only calculated to prepare and fit the academian for the university, we ought to exert every power to carry fo illufrious a defign into full effect.

The PRESENT MENTS of the Grand Jurors for the County of Richmond.

WE the Grand Jury for the county of Rich-Firft. The Juflices of the Peace for not support-

ing the laws in general better than they have been fince the revolution, and especially in not using greater exertions to suppress tipling houses, gambling, profane fwearing, and drunkenness, and are forry to observe that many of them fall into those vices, which their duty compels them to punith in others.

Second. That no legal mode is at present adopted to effectually compel the citizens of this flate to fend aftifance to repair the public roads, which is

a great injury to the community,

Third. That the unhuman practice of duelling, fo much in fathion at prefent, is not prevented, which we conceive is highly repugnant to the Laws of God, and every civilized country; may tend to deprive this flate of many of her valuable citizens, cramps that fociability that ought to fubfift in friendly fociety, and gives a fanction to individuals to dispose of their lives which God and our country only have a right to claim.

Fourth. That no equitable mode is at prefent adopted by the Legislature for the recovery of flrays, the old Toll Act we conceive to be of little more advantage to the owner than absolute robbery, and the taker-up is not benefited thereby.

Fifth. That the great lenity of the present Law against horse and cattle thieves induced bad men to commit offences of that kind, to the great injury of the good citizens: We therefore recommend to the next Legislature, that all perfons convicted of flealing horses or cattle, suffer death for the first offence, unless recommended to mercy.

Sixtb. That John Ingerfoll fuffers gambling in his house, and retails spirituous liquors above the rates allowed by law.

Seventh. That William Thompson and Benjamin Townfend retails fpirituous liquors above the rates allowed by law.

Eighth. That Abia Clay retails spirituous liquors above the rates allowed by law, and keeps a ball-battery.

Nimb. We recommend that the alterations in the conflitution proposed by the Honorable the Legislature be carried into effect by the people.

Tenib. We recommend to the Honorable the Legislature, that all the paper money that may come into the public treafury over and above the fum necessary to pay the expences of the late expedition against the Creek Indians, and to answer the immediate exigencies of government, be deftroyed.

Eleventh. We express our disapprobation of the rigid mode adopted by the late Legislature, in calling John Appling, Efq. to account for his conduct as Quarter-Mafter-General of this state, and are forry to observe that the Presentments of the

last Grand Jury of this county against that honorable body, for fitting on the Sabbath on public bufinefs, had not the defired effect.
