Holy Ghost, Amen. - After trusting my soul to God, and committing
my body to the earth. I Matthea Boyer of the County and State
aforesaid, being of sound and disposing mind and memory, and
considering the uncertainty of this mortal life. Do make and pub-
lish this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all and every
Will or Wills by me heretofore made.

- First, I desire that all my just debts be paid.
- Second, I give and bequeath to my daughter Abigail Thomas the wife of Mr George P. Simpson, parcel and separate use, the sum of Twenty Dollars.
- Third, I give and bequeath to my son Robert Thomas Boyer the sum of Twenty Dollars.
- Fourth, I give and bequeath to my daughter Adeline John the sum of Twenty Dollars.
- Fifth, I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary the sum of Twenty Dollars.

my daughter Melrose therefore
including as well as her future
husband against her husband and
the following named property
to wit of Augustus situated on the
South side of Market Street bounded on the North
by Market Street on the East by lot now or formerly Peter's Kelly's and
the South by Ellis Street and on the West by T. C. Kelly's Lot and
conveyed to me by William Thompson. Also a negro woman named
Blanche and her male child named Charles; also two small negro
named John and Henry the children of a woman I purchased of Mr.
John P. King. It is my will that if my said daughter
Melrose should die unmarried no child or children that the
property herein bequeathed to her shall go to my other children, share
and share alike.

Fourth, I give and bequeath to my daughter Adeline, Julia, Matilda
and her children, two negro girls named Jennie and Eliza and any
child or children they now have or may hereafter have; the
said negroes to be held by my wife Mary Gertrude Bonney, during
her natural life. If it should become necessary for in the opinion
of my wife best to sell either or both of said negroes, the value
of them is to be made good to my said daughter, out of the
balance of my estate.

Fifth, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Gertrude
Bonney, all the residue of my estate of whatsoever kind it may be
to dispose of by will or otherwise as she may think proper, ex-
cept my house and lot in Telfair Street occupied by me, situated
at the death of my said wife I give and bequeath to my daugh-
ter Adeline Julia Matilda and her children.

Sixth, In consideration of the very faithful services of my ser-
vant woman Mary, it is my will and desire, that at the
death of my wife she should be emancipated and set free, it
being my strong desire that she should have the benefit of
her freedom and I request my Executors to carry this my wish
into effect as far as they can.

Seventh, To my beloved wife Mary Gertrude I give the power to sell and
dispose of any portion of the property she may think proper to sell
if however a negro boy named Louis should not be sold at the
time of her death, I will that he be then sold and the price
be equally divided between my daughter Melrose Therese and my
son Robert Francis Bonney. I will that if a tract of land
near the Millwrights Road known as Mr. Segers should not be dis-
posed of by my said wife during her life, that it be divided
equally between my son Robert Francis Bonney and my daughter
Adeline Matilda, for the use and benefit of them and their
children.

Eighth, I give and bequeath to my
