South Carolina being of sound mind and capable of making a disposition
of my worldly substance, do make and publish this my last will and Testament in
witness and form following

Item. It is my will and desire that all my just debts to paid by my
executors as soon after my decease as conveniently can be done

Item. I give and bequeath to my dear grand niece Mary Fitchard
my gold watch to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my dear grand nephew Leonard Watkins
groves, the amount of money that may be due to me from the Estate of my
late Brother Thomas Hornby at the time of my death to him and to his heirs
forever.

Item. I give to my niece Mr. Blandine ^{my} Groves who has intermarried with
Mr. Sylvanus B. Groves, my silver watch and all my furniture in her possession
in Augusta, with the exception of my slab, which I give to my dear niece Mr. Henry
Harrison, who has intermarried with Mr. Emmet Harrison, to them the said
Mr. B. Groves and Mr. H. Harrison respectively and to their heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my dear niece Emma Raymond Hornby
the bedding, bedstead and clothing that I have at Greenville South Carolina with the
other articles that I have at the same place: the money that I may have in
possession in actual cash, and that may be due to me arising from interest
on money that I have or interest exclusive of the bequests already made, the
further sum of nine hundred Dollars and also the three following negro Slaves
viz Mary Eliza and Kate with their future issue and increase to her the above
named Emma Raymond Hornby and to her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath to my true friend William D. Johnson of the district
and state aforesaid all the property both real and personal, of which I may be
possessed and not heretofore disposed of to have and to hold to him his heirs
and assigns in special Trust exclusively for the benefit use and behoof of my
dear niece Mr. Blandine Kelsall Fitchard who has intermarried with Mr. John
Fitchard of this State, and the heirs of her body forever.

Item. I do hereby constitute and appoint my esteemed and well tried
friend Doctor Anderson Watkins of the City of Augusta in the State of Georgia
my Executor to this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all other
wills by me heretofore made.

In a former will that I made but which I have now revoked I bequeathed to my dear niece Mary now Mrs. Hanfton the sum of Five hundred Dollars but I have now in my present and renewed the bequest, I now state as my reason for this alteration, that as she with her two sisters Ann and Hannah are provided for by marriage it appears to me to be my duty to make provision for my niece Emma who is younger and otherwise not well provided for, and also to make some provision for my niece Mr. Truchard and her large family since it hath pleased divine providence to visit them with much affliction

Greenville S.C. 21st January 1825

I formerly left the following things to my dear niece Claudia R. Foster the following articles, which not being of any value real except for their antiquity in the family I have left out of this will and wish to leave them, small value as they are to my dear friends in this place just as a remembrance of a relation.

I give to my highly esteemed friend Reverend William B. Johnson my writing desk. I give to my dear niece Harrietta Johnson a cash cloth which is a but thirty years old, and to my dear Mary B. Johnson my grand mother's large silver soup spoon being in the family about fifty years — The pecuniary necessity of my other relations was the reason of my giving these dear relations no more substantial testimony of my high esteem and tender love. My dear friends of the family, this I hope they are convinced of and will accept the above trifles as they are presented by an affectionate aunt who is overflowing with feelings the most tender, for the unremitted kindness which they have shown to me while with them
