I give and bequeath my Watch to my eldest son George

I give and bequeath my Silver Sleeve buttons to my second son John Black

I give and bequeath to my other Children some small present at the discretion

of my beloved Wife and my other Executors.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife the family Bible, Casket, Trunk

and such other devotional Books as she may think fit.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife the remaining part of the money

of all the disbursements of my Executors.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife all my Clothing to be divided

among my Children.

I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife all the furniture

and all other household goods.

Thus my Will and desire that

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th inst. in relation to the MS. mentioned therein with liberty to extract therefrom or alter or to copy therefrom. I promised you that if I should deem it prudent to publish the same I should be punctilious in doing so, and I shall think it the whole or any part of them, and particularly the manuscript entitled "Universalism" very proper and commendable. As I think proper to publish the whole, I shall think it my duty to do so, paying himself for his labor, and the expense of printing out of the fruit exactly if there should be any means of it, and I beg leave to say beloved Wife if I should be absent from home, if not, it is my will and desire that the children be equally among all Children. I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved Wife, Sarah, sister Euseb. and Joseph B. Briggs all three of them to be Guardians of the Orphan of said Children of said MS. I do not mean to say that I have the same to sell, but I do wish to say of it in the year of our Lord 1818.
