

It is my will & desire that at the death of my said son Patrick H. Clayton in trust for the use & benefit of my said son P. Barnes if he should be alive at the death of my son Patrick. The other part to go to the same person in trust & for the especial use & benefit of my grand son Johnson Barnes if he should be alive at the death of my son Patrick. And in the event of the death of all or either of the persons above named at the time of my son Patrick's death then the part of such as be dead shall go to the right heirs of my late brother William West. It is my will & desire that the thousand dollars given under the conditions aforesaid to my grand son Johnson Barnes shall not take effect, if my son Patrick dies before the said Johnson arrives at age, but that he shall be confined to his third part as above given.

Richmond County } In the name of God; amen I Aarath Gilbert of said County and State being awake in body but of sound and disposing mind, do make this my last will and testament. First, I desire that all my just debts be paid as soon as practicable after my decease.

Second, I give devise and bequeath unto Mary Ann Johnson my negro slave named Lem and the sum of two thousand dollars.

Third, All the rest and residue of my estate remaining after the payment of my debts, funeral expenses and the above Legacy, I give to my wife Ann Gilbert, my sister Esther Gallagher, Sally Stone and Hannah Gilbert to be equally divided between them share and share alike. provided always that my Executor shall invest in some safe and sound manner the amount coming to my wife, so that she may receive the income thereof during her life and after her death the said income or the property in which it may be invested I give to my nephew Gilbert James Gallagher his heirs and assigns - and provide also that the amount coming to my sister Esther Gallagher shall be paid her sole and separate use and be invested by my Executor for her benefit so that neither it nor the income thereof shall be liable for the debts or contracts of her husband.

Fourth, I hereby nominate and appoint James B. Bushnell of this my last will and testament and authorize him to sell or convey or any other portion of my property (without the necessity of obtaining leave of the Court of Ordinary) in order to carry the foregoing bequest to Mary Ann Johnson and my sister Esther Gallagher. And no interest shall be paid on the said legacy to Mary Ann Johnson.
