Burlew, five hundred dollars each. I give to my nieces Ann W. Standish of Bristol, Rebecca M. Annison, Eliza J. Buldy, Henrietta A. Polhill, Margaret L. Polhill, Rebecca M. Polhill and Susan W. Bowman five hundred dollars each. I give to my friend Mr. D. L. Woodlawn of Abbeville two hundred dollars, and three hundred dollars to him for his children. I give to my friend Mr. W. A. Catcliff of Charleston three hundred dollars and to his five sons fifty dollars each. I give to my friend Mr. Mary E. Fendall two hundred dollars as a token of my regard. I give to my niece Margaret J. Polhill my gold watch and bracelets and the six table spoons, and two spoons and sugar tongs that were given to me by my late Aunt Elizabeth Hamilton of Mullin.
