

I being of sound and disposing mind and memory, do hereby publish and declare that my last will and testament is that all the property which I may die possessing of be sold, disposed, to be hereinafter mentioned at such times as the judgment shall think proper, and without any application to the Court of Ordinary for leave to do so, and always at reasonable notice of the time and place of selling. And after the payment of all my just debts, I devise the remainder of the funds which my effects may bring to be vested in such property as my executor may think most advisable, and in trust for the use and benefit of my wife Sarah A. Dumbear during her natural life, and at her death for the use and benefit of my son Percy S. Dumbear and my daughter Sarah A. Dumbear.

I hereby nominate and appoint my friend John Haffield the executor to this my last will.
