Whereas in and by the last Will & testament of my brother
John Willson late of the City of Augusta and State of Georgia Esq. died
the sum of Ten thousand Dollars is bequeathed unto me but made subject
to forfeiture in case any endeavor should be made by me to enslave any
the Persons of Color manumitted or set free, Now know all men by
these presents that I Hugh Willson of Carlisle in the State of Pennsylvania
do hereby acknowledge to have received of and from John Course and John Willson
Executors of the last Will and testament of my deceased brother John Willson the
sum of Ten thousand Dollars, being the Legacy bequeathed unto me as
aforesaid, and do hereby acquit release exonerate and for ever discharge the
John Course and John Willson, Executors aforesaid, their heirs Executors
and Administrators from all actions, demands, suits and causes of actions
whatsoever touching or concerning the Legacy aforesaid. And I the said
Hugh Willson for the consideration aforesaid do hereby for myself, my
heirs Executors and Administrators release and renounce all right title
interest and claim whatsoever as well in law as Equity to the Persons &
voluntary services of Henry Keating, Charles Keating, Aaron Keating,
George Keating and Betty their mothers, and to Henry Keatings children, viz
Betsey & Elsie, and to their and every of their future issue and enslave
that that each and every of them and their future issue shall and may
enjoy all the rights and privileges of Persons born free.

In the name of God amen. I John Atwell of Richmond County
and State of Georgia, being weak of body, but of perfect mind and memory
humble be given to God for the same, knowing that it is appointed for all men
New, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, touching
such worldly Estate wherewith it has pleased God to bless me with in my
life. I give demise and dispose of the same in the following manner and for
First of all I give and bequeath to my beloved Wife Sumner Atwell the plantation
whereon I now live together with all the plantation tools two feather
beds and bedsteads and furniture, two mares, eight, horses and two Cattle
and her choice of five Cows & Calves, ten Cows thirty head of Hogs, ten
hens & Eggs, to be hers during her widowhood, after her death remaining
the same to be divided amongst my Children, also it is my request that
my Wife may have all my Kitchen and house furniture for the above mentioned
time. Secondly. I give and bequeath to my son James Atwell two hundred
acres of land where he now is building and a Negro Boy named Ansel
and a Girl slave named Edy, a sorrel Horse a Cow and Calf, four Cows
Piggy. I give and bequeath unto my son Redding Atwell a Negro boy
named Leander and a Girl named Leaphonia one feather bed and furniture
Elender Atwell my daughter I give and bequeath a Negro Clerk named
Buck when she marries, if she lives single my Executor to hire her
out and my Daughter Elender to receive the benefit thereof, after her
death if no lawful issue to be divided amongst my Children.
I give and bequeath to my Daughter Polly Atwell a Negro Girl named
Nashel. I give and bequeath to my son John Atwell a Negro Girl
named Victory. I give and bequeath to my son Rankin Atwell a Negro
boy named Isaac, the balance of the land at my Wife's death remains
to be equally divided between my five sons named John & Rankin &
I desire that the Negro named Matheony should be hired out for the
maintaining & educating of the young Children, and when
of age for Matheony to be sold & the money to be
divided amongst my Children, also
