 The foregoing last will and testament of John Smith, late of the
 Richmond, deceased, was presented in court by Edward Primrose, an
 Attorney, one of the witnesses thereto subscribed, being sworn on the aid
 of Almighty God, made oath that he was personally present and did
 read, sign, seal, publish, pronounce and declare the same to be an
 his last will and testament, that he was of sound, disposing mind
 according to the best of his knowledge and belief, and that he together
 Nathan Jones and Lucy Heard subscribed their names as witnesses
 of the request and in the presence of the said testator and in the
 each other. Whereupon it was ordered to be recorded.
