

Richmond Co. Georgia, March 2nd 1815.
I, John Twigg, of the County of Richmond, State of Georgia, being weak in body but of sound mind and memory, blessed be the Almighty God for the same, do hereby certify the following as my last will and testament.

I give and bequeath unto my beloved Wife Ruth Twigg the property of Mrs. Small, Britton, Pitts, Mella, McLean, Little Ben, and the place called Camp Ground and on which I now live, together with the house and out houses appertaining thereto, and all the husband's personal property belonging to the same and also my two Carriage horses and harness and Carriage to have hold and enjoy all the benefits & profits arising therefrom for and during the term of her natural life, and at death of my beloved wife it is my will that the above property be made and personal to be divided between my Children share and share alike. I give and bequeath unto my beloved sons Abraham Twigg, George Twigg, David Twigg, Asa Twigg and my Daughter Mary Twigg now Frank Green the balance and residue of both my real and personal Estate to be divided equally between them, share and share alike to them and their heirs for ever in fee simple, And I hereby appoint my beloved Wife Ruth Twigg Executrix and my two sons George & David Twigg my Executors of this my last Will & Testament, revoking all former wills by me made, In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 20th Day of April 1815 the 10th day of the month of April of the Independence of the United States of America hold and deliver in
