I John W. Walker of the County and State aforesaid
being of sound mind though weak in body and knowing that it
is appointing unto all men once to die do make and ordain
this to be my last will and testament.

First. It is my will and desire that all my just debts be
paid as speedily as possible out of funds now in hand and
money now due me to be collected by my Executor hereinafter
named -

Secondly. I give and bequeath unto my beloved Nephew
J^r James Bayard Walker one hundred dollars to be paid
out of the first money coming to the hands of my Executor
after the payment of my just debts.

Thirdly. It is my will and desire that all the remaining
part of my estate both real and personal of whatsoever kind
be divided as equally as may be into three several parts
to be disposed of in the manner following to-wit- I give
and bequeath unto my beloved brother - Benjamin G. Walker
one third of the property divided as aforesaid into three equal
parts, to him and his heirs forever. I further give and bequeath
unto my beloved sister Margaret Walker, Rebecca Walker
and Rachael Walker one other third of the property real and
personal to be divided as above directed to be held by them
in joint-tenancy to them and their heirs forever - I also
give and bequeath unto the children of my deceased brother
Ruben Walker the remaining third part of the property real
and personal to be divided as above directed to take and have
the same share and share alike unto them and their

hired forward.

Lastly, I nominate, constitute and appoint my beloved son Benjamin I. Walker sole Executor of this my last will & Testament.
