I Louisa S. Woolfolk being weak of body, but at present of perfect mind and sound and disposing memory, do make, ordain and publish my last will and Testament as follows: that is to say -

First. I will that my body be buried in decent christian burial, and that my funeral expenses and just debts be paid by my Executors.

Second. I give and bequeath to Emmilia V. Callow & to her son Nathaniel Callow the sum of five hundred Dollars each, to be paid by my Executors, at a convenient time after my decease, to them severally and their several heirs forever.

Third. I give and bequeath to my son in law George W. Rowan two thousand Dollars to him and his heirs forever.

Fourth. I give and bequeath to my son in law John A. Mann one thousand Dollars, to him and his heirs forever.

and I give and bequeath the same, what I now own, to the
sole and separate care of my Daughter Parmelia Rountree in trust,
that she will preserve and give the same to her first Daughters if
I should ever have issue - if not, to the issue of the same at her (my
Daughter's death) as she may think proper -
And I give and bequeath all the rest and residue of the Estate of what
I may die possessed, of whatever kind or description the same may be,
to Robert H. Mudge, John Woolfolk, Edward Butler, & Oliver Metcalf,
and the survivors of them - In Trust that they will collect the income
and profits of said Estate, and the same, from time to time,
pay over to the sole and separate use of my Daughter Parmelia Rountree
for and during the term of her natural life, and at and after the
death of the said Parmelia - Then, in Trust, for such child or children
as she may leave by the said George R. Rountree, or any future husband
she and I have alike, to them their Heirs and assigns forever -
Fourth - It is my will and desire, that if my Daughter before aforesaid
should die leaving no children - or having left children, they should die
leaving no issue at any time, within twenty one years, after the death
of my said Daughter then and in that case, that the said Robert H.
Mudge, John Woolfolk, Edward Butler, & Oliver Metcalf, or the survivors
or survivors of them shall pay to Mrs Mary Cheek (or her then
surviving children in case of her death) the sum of One Thousand Dollars.
And the remainder of the Trust Estate (as before given them) which may be
in their hands shall pay over and deliver to Emmeline V. Callen and
Nathaniel Callen share and share alike, to them, their Heirs and assigns
forever -

Eighth - It is my will and desire that the trustees named in the sixth
article of this my last will shall have power, by the consent in writing
of the said Parmelia, to make such investments of the Trust Estate as may
be in their hands, as may in their opinion be most advantageous to the
parties beneficially interested -
Ninth - I hereby appoint Robert H. Mudge and George R. Rountree
trustees with full power to them to do all things necessary and proper
