The last Will and Testament

of Mayow Wilson considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, and  
being of sound mind and memory, do make and publish this my  
last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to  
say, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Esther Wilson during  
my natural life, during this the plantation where in I now live  
together with all the land attached to said tract or premises, that  
I have not heretofore deeded, together with two horses and fifteen  
head of cattle, also all my stock of hogs and sheep, together with  
all my household and kitchen furniture. I also bequeath unto my  
beloved wife six negroes, namely, the man Tom, one Henry, and one  
man named Penny and two aged girls, Ely and Abby, all of which  
property real and personal is to be sold at her death by my two  
named executors and the profits equally divided between them  
of my heirs. Item again, I wish immediately after my decease that  
my executors proceed to sell my negroes namely Nancy and William an  
Ely & Ann and Nelson together with all my stock of all kinds that  
have not heretofore been sold or deeded and to pay to the use of my  
son John Wilson as follows to Martha the sum of ten dollars  
and the sum of two hundred dollars to Elizabeth the sum of  
hundred dollars to William the sum of two hundred dollars  
and the sum of two hundred dollars. It is my will and desire  
that my executors sell two lots of land originally drawn in lots

in my great City drawn  
therefrom together with my  
property all my just debts and expenses necessary  
to pay and law suites and all other legal expenses of ap-  
pointment and law suites and all other legal claims whatsoever  
then and thereafter arising, and the surplus if any equally dis-  
tributed between my wife and the heirs of her body and I do hereby  
appoint my beloved son in law Edward Parryman son my Executor  
to carry into execution this my last Will and Testament hereby  
mentioning all former Wills by me made be witness whereof I have  
hereunto set my hand and seal this sixth day of February in the  
year of A.D. eighteen hundred and thirty four his  
Signature sealed published and  
deemed by the above Major + Watson mark
