in mind and memory do make and publish this my last will and testament
in witness that all my just debts be paid.
I give and bequeath to my grand son William Walton, son of Thomas Jefferson
Walton, my negro man named Confid to him the said William Walton his heirs and
assigns Three, Three and bequeath three hundred dollars to my daughter Josephine
the purpose of purchasing her a Prime Fide, and it is my will that a good Prime Fide be purchased
for her as soon as it can be conveniently done, or as soon as funds sufficient therefor are realized from
my estate. Fourth, I give and bequeath three hundred dollars to my son Alexander S. Ginnage
the purpose of purchasing for him such law books, or other books as he may require, to be
purchased for him as soon as funds therefor are realized from my estate, or as soon as I
may make them. Fifth, I give and bequeath the one half of all the residue of my estate
whatsoever nature or kind soever, as well what I may be entitled to under the will of my
husband John Ginnage, as any other property I may be possessed of, or entitled to in any
way, to Thomas Jefferson Walton and Lucinda Walton, to have and hold the same to them
their heirs and assigns forever. Sixth, the other half of all my property after the foregoing
legacies are paid, I give and bequeath to Thomas Jefferson Walton to be held in trust for
use and benefit of my son William Walton for and during the term of his natural life, and
it is my will that the said half of my property so given in trust be vested in some prudent
person, either in Bonds stock or other ways, or loaned out on ample security, so as to produce
an annual income or interest for the use of my said son William Walton and during
his life that the interest or income arising from this portion of my estate be applied to the
support of him my said son William, and the same is hereby given to him for such
purpose during the term of his natural, and after his death it is my will that the said half so applied
to the use of my said son William be given and it is hereby given, to Thomas Jefferson and his
heirs and assigns forever. My Will and intention being that one half of
my property, after the foregoing legacies are paid, shall be given and it is hereby given to Thomas
Jefferson Walton and his wife Lucinda and their heirs and assigns forever and the
other half so applied at interest, to be held in trust by Thomas Jefferson Walton for the benefit of
my said son William for his support during his natural life, and after his death, the same to be an-
nually paid to Thomas Jefferson and Lucinda Walton their heirs and assigns forever -
I hereby certify that I have read and signed this twenty eight day of June in the year
of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty three.

and in the presence of the Testatrix and in the presence of each other, Whereupon it must
be recorded that same be recorded.

County, with the whole computed to contain four hundred acres more or less, also my undivided share in
my appurtenances, in Richmond County containing thirty three acres more or less and tenement in
William Bugg sent decd. - I give to my beloved wife Mary Bugg all my negroes and household
furniture, and all my stock of every description, also my plantation tools, and my negroes
and all that my beloved wife Mary Bugg be seized and possessed of the whole of my estate and
intention of what nature or kind, soever, to be held by her and her heirs forever.
