I recommend my soul to God trusting his pardon for all offences committed against him, my body to be buried in a plain and decent manner at the discretion of my Executors, Trusting such worldly estate as it has been pleased God to bless me with to be disposed of in the following manner.

First It is my will and Desire that all my last debts be faithfully paid.
Secondly It is my will and Desire that my property both real & personal be better possession of by my Executor immediately after my death and that he manage the same in a way that he may think best for the interest of my two sons David Boutet and Peter Boutet and that each of them have an equal part thereof to them & their heirs for ever to be given into their possession whenever they may arrive to the full age of twenty one years.
Thirdly I do hereby appoint my friend Walter Longmire my Executor to carry this my Will into execution. Given under my hand and seal the twentieth day of October in the year of our Lord 1810.

aforesaid, and do hereby acquit release exonerate and for ever discharge their
John Course and John Willson, Executors aforesaid, their heirs Executors
and Administrators from all actions, demands, suits and causes of actions
whatsoever touching or concerning the Legacy aforesaid. And I the said
Hugh Willson for the consideration aforesaid do hereby for myself, my
heirs Executors and Administrators release and renounce all right title
interest and claim whatsoever as well in law as Equity to the Persons
voluntary services of Mary Keating, Charles Keating, Aaron Keating
George Keating and Patty her mother, and to Tommy Keatings children
Betsey & Martha, and to their and every of their future issue and ensure
that each and every of them and their future issue shall and may
enjoy all the rights and privileges of Persons born free.
