ordain this my last will & Testament in manner & form following. Recalling all
other Wills (Vols.) First I will that all my debts & funeral charges be paid —
2nd I give unto my dear & loving wife all my estate both Real & Personal from
the time of her natural life, & then to be divided in manner & form following
(Vols.) 1st I give & bequeath unto my daughter, Hodeah Brykin the tract of land
on which I now dwell containing 250 Acres also 150 acres adjoining the same
with all the appurtenances thereunto, and all the Cattle that is in her own name
& one half my flock of Hogs, & all my household & Kitchen furniture, one Wal maye
Also one horse, 2nd I give unto my son John Brykin one Cow & Calf, 3rd I give unto
my daughter Elah & her husband, George Mock one Cow an Calf, 4th I give & bequeath
to unto my son Lodewick Brykin all the balance of my Cattle & hogs & my further
Red & ten Horses, also my working tools & my gun, Lastly I do make & constitute
Sarah Brykin, my said wife & Lodewick Brykin, my son Executors of this my last
Will & Testament dated this 20th day 1816. —
