

The Last Will and Testament of
Hamilton Amos

Georgia - On the 20th day of Feb
1862 George Amos of
Greene county, Ga. Hamilton Amos
of said county being of sound mind and
disposing memory, said Amos, that
it is appointed unto all men once to die
to make this my last will and testament
in manner & form following:-

1st I commend my soul into
the hands of God our God and my body
to be decently buried by my executor herein
after named.

2nd I will that all my just debts be
paid by my executor out of the first money
collected from debts due me.

3rd I give and bequeath to my dear
beloved daughter Mary T. McMuth in trust
and confidence that she will use or lend
out the same at interest and annually pay
and apply said interest to the support and
maintenance of my said daughter Mary
T. McMuth for and during her natural
life and at her death the aforesaid sum
of money to be equally divided among
my children and if either of them should
die before the said Mary T. McMuth their
children to stand in their place and stead
of said deceased child. Said five hundred
dollars to be raised by my executor within
three months after my death and in no
event is said five hundred dollars to go
to William McMuth or in payment of
his debt.

4th I give and bequeath all the rest and

and estate of my Estate both real and
personal to be equally divided between my
beloved wife Hannah Amos and my children
William Amos, James Amos, William M
Amos and Martha Mauden

I further nominate and appoint my
son James Amos Executor to carry this
my last will and testament into effect
thoroughly executing all former wills by me
made or Given under my hand before
this 20th September 1834
