and testament, in manner & form following.

of my executors, and to be interred, yea & laid, whereof he shall give
toll upon ye. & give and bequeath in the following manner.

Item 1. give and bequeath unto my executors Mr. Thomas
ellott & Mr. John L. Brown, now two continuing hereinafter
as executors to me, also one other trusty friend agreeing certain
sums of money, to every man, as follows and to t. thomas a higher
natural right or by bloodhood. And my will and desire is, that
after the death of my beloved wife, that the above mentioned sum
should be equally divided between my beloved sons, Mr. W. S. Sanders
and Mr. Brown L. Sanders. And my will and desire is, that if my
beloved son, George Sanders should stand in need of assistance
the death of my Mother, then in that case, for his mother's sake
make him a little to the one hundred a copy, adjoining my home
trust. & also give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Mary Sanders
all my i. Vayay, Cattle, Stock & effects of every kind, household
and Kitchen furniture of every kind, to have and to hold during
her natural life, & to her children after her death, my
will and desire is for all to be equally divided among my
beloved children, George Sanders, William Sanders, & Charles
Sanders, a house & kitchen, stock & furniture, partly Sanders &
a landingsite.

Memorandum I give you to make out as follows concerning
the result of our business together to be drawn out of the money collected
at the deposition of your execution. And my will and desire is,
that of every one of the Gold should stand in aid of any kind of
thing my wife or for any other person in that says my childrens step
and through them my wife should receive.
Memorandum I give you to make out as follows concerning the sum of money
Dix More called Pig to have and to hold forever
as the witness made before the affgeant.

(4) I swear, I doe make and witness my hand & seal - Mary, Shadrach and
my beloved wife, Anna Taylor, my lawful weddron, to this my last will,
quit and Testement - In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my
hand and affixed my seal, this twentieth day of July, one thousand
eight hundred and seventeen.

I make & witness in this County of Lancashire, this 1st day of July, in the year of our Lord 1700, and in the 21st year of his reign, that my body, but of course and ordinary age, and nothing to award the Mortality of my body, do make and ordain, by my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, That I give my Will, that my family and property be kept together, during my life, by my widow, or her heirs, children, or Cheltears, then my brotherly to be used, and equally divided among my three
brother Brighton, John Brantley, Cynthia Brantley, Anna
Brantley, Lucy Brantley, Harry Brantley, & Mary Brantley.
In the event of my death, I give my widow, Cynthia Brantley,
and son John a share of my property, such as he had
at the time of my death, and her carriage, two head of bedding, and a bed of covery,
Herr bed, such together with all my Household furniture, &c. &c. &c.
Item after paying all my Just debts, all my Money, together
with the goods arising from my Body or otherwise to be put out to
alms, for the rags and benefit of my Hospital, as also the sum of
one thousand and eight hundred pounds, to be divided between
John Brantley and Benjamin Brantley, of Duxbury each in the sum of £1000
per annum.
