

(105.) In the Name of God, Amen
I, Ebenezer Brinkley, Planter, of the State of Georgia, Warren
County, being indisposed as to bodily health, but (through mercy)
of perfect and sound mind and memory, considering the uncertainty
of this transitory life and the certainty of death, knowing that it is
advisable for all men once to die, have thought fit to make & renew
this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following.
I do give and bequeath to my beloved daughter, Mary Somers,
three Negroes wombs, viz a girl, one and a half, and a Negro boy all which she
has already in possession; together with their increase to her, her
husband Ebenezer Brinkley, and her two children named John, one Negro
woman named Nancy, and one Negro girl named Ruth, together
with their increase, which three Negroes she has already received
to her, in her and signing for me.

I give and bequeath to my beloved son Thomas Brinkley, one
tract or division of land which he now has, containing by estimation
one hundred, eighty acres, and one half acre, to the said man or wife
and one other tract or division thereof adjoining, purchased by me of
John Somers, containing one hundred acres, by the name
of the same. This one Negro fellow named Tom, the Negro boy Nancy,
the Negro woman Ruth, and her two children, Ebenezer and Mary, her
husband Ebenezer Brinkley, also two of my slaves, who are being at my
service, and from Michael Long, to him his heirs & assigns forever;
I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Elizabeth Brinkley
one Negro, Silenus Pethon, one Negro slave after, and his two
children Dandy, and Sandy, the Negro Nancy Bell, one Negress
Nancy, and their increase, and Michael Long, the Negro
also one Black pony, and her saddle and bridle, which
are already in her possession together with all her clothing or
affairs, to her, her heirs and assigns, forever.

I give and bequeath to my beloved son Ebenezer Brinkley,
the plantation and tract of land on which I now live, containing
by estimation five hundred and fifty acres, also one other
tract by estimation of two hundred and fifty acres, purchased
of Robert Barry, also one tract estimated at one hundred
acres, purchased of Dr. Agar Somers, all adjoining each other,

across the following. Whereas I, J. J. one Negro fellow, named
Dick, in this County, one White named Miller, and his two
children, Henry and John, and a Negro girl, named Matilda,
together with their increase to him, his heirs and affigees forever.
Also, all the residue of my Estate, not otherwise disposed of by
this Will, I, J. J. give, bequeath, command, direct, and
distribute hereunder, receiving and take such debts as may
be due me or near money on hand at the time of my decease,
after payment of my just debts and funeral expenses, to be
remained to him the said Negroes Miller and Matilda, his heirs & affigees
forever; Subject to the following restrictions: viz. It is my will
and desire, that my two other Negroes Harris and Kate, remain
on the Farm and Plantation on which I now live, under the
direction and control of my said son George, his children to
my right legatee, and wife that I am executor until her
time, and receive from me a certain English establishment
apart, during their residence there, some inseparable labor
or service, and that they do hereby constitute, and take in
my beloved son Thomas Cooper and my loving & beloved daughter
Hattie, limitations of this my last Will and Testament, leaving
disinheriting and debaring them void all former or other will
or Wills, testament or testamentary, in my lifetime made
or done, and also void all and every clause and article
in last Will, in Testimony whereof I, J. J. have hereunto
set my hand this 1st day of January, in the year of our Lord
one thousand eight hundred and forty five, and have signed
the same in the presence of the following witnesses, who have
hereunto set their hands this 1st day of January, in the year
one thousand eight hundred and forty five, and have signed
the same in the presence of the following witnesses, who have

and that in his possession, and at his registration in the province of

I, James Gray, of the State of Georgia and County of Marion
being of sound mind and memory, do make, reduce in due time this
instrument to be my last Will and Testament. Reciting all things,
First - To my Darling wife, I give and bequeath the household
and Kitchen furniture, of every sort and kind, which may
be on hand, at the time of my decease; with one Stock of cloth
and linens as I now desire, to a woman named Hannah, and
the use of my hunting traps for the term of her natural life;
Second - I give and bequeath the sum of one hundred dollars, and
a hundred acres in the Township of the said Wilkinson, and
I bequeath in the same place, as follows by number one hundred
and one only, towards the sum of the above;

In the year of the Lord one thousand eight
hundred and forty eight, the sum of one hundred dollars, to be equally
divided between them, and to be paid to them by my executors,
as near as the grace of God will bring to the age of eighteen years; in
case of their death, there should be no less than one hundred and
fifty dollars, to be divided between them, and to be paid to them
as near as the grace of God will bring to the age of eighteen
years; and if both die before the age of eighteen years, the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars
shall be paid to the next of kin, to be divided among them, and to be paid to them
as near as the grace of God will bring to the age of eighteen years; and if the said
executors or administrators among them leave a daughter, the
sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, shall be paid to her, and bequeathed to
her, and the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, to a woman named Mary, and
a Virginian named Alice, for the use of the instrument.

15th - To my son -
will be sent one hundred Dollars as also a Negro man
named Peter, worth one Thousand Dollars and his
one equal half of the Sink o' Thong, County, Hargrave, plantation
Tools of every kind; also four hundred Dollars, for the pur-
chase of darkening the Legacy contained in the will of John
and son of John Whitehill.
With my love to all my friends I give and bequeath the other
