

The will of Richard Walden deceased  
In the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and

I Richard Walden of the County of Warren  
and State of Georgia, being in a low state of health, but in sound mind  
and memory, and bearing in mind that it is meet appointed for all  
men to die, and as for what earthly treasure it has pleased God to  
bless me with, I give devise and bequeath the same in the manner and  
form following to viz.

In the first place I recommend my soul unto God  
and into the care of his holy keeping, and my body to be buried in a  
plain but decent manner.

Item 1. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mary Walden, her  
life or widowhood the following real estate and personally property the  
tract of land wherein I now live, also the Gibbs tract containing one  
hundred and seventyfive acres, and one hundred and fifty acres known  
as the Aque tract and a part of the Brandy tract commencing at the upper  
corner of the Newland field and running a strait line, to the head of  
Dyke's Branch <sup>more</sup> or less. Also six Negroes and all my house-  
hold furniture, farming utensials and all my stock of every descrip-  
tion, consisting of horses, hags, cattle and sheep, and all my corn  
cotton, fadders pees and potataos.

Item 2 My will and desire is at my death, for my Negro man  
Seboy to be sold and the money equally divided among my  
children with the exception of Permelia Allen her part to be for the use  
of her children and the use of her body under the management of  
my executors for her as her necessities may require.

And the six Negroes and their increase if any at the death of wife  
to be appraised and drawn for among my children and those that  
draws the greatest prises to pay to those who draw the least in propor-  
tion to their value Permelia Allen's part to be for the use of her body  
and her children under the management of my executors as above  
stated.

Item 3 I gave unto my two daughters Malinda & Phalba Walden  
one feather bed three bed quilts and three sheets each.

Item 4 One hundred and fifty dollars when collected to be equally  
divided among all my children Permelia Allen's part to be mana-  
ged as above stated.

Item 5 I gave unto my son Alfred at the death of my wife one  
Negro boy by the name of Tom which negro is not included in  
the above six which my wife is to have during her life or  
widowhood. I also give unto my son Alfred all the above

described land that will go to my wife after death.

Item 6. To my wife during her life or widowhood one  
yoke of Mares and Cart for the use of the family.

Item 7 I gave unto my son in law Edward Allen five dollars.  
Item 8 All my property that is not gave off in this will to be  
sold after the death of my wife and the money equally as  
above stated. I do hereby appoint Amos Walden, William G. Wal-  
den and Henry Walden Executors of this my last Will and  
testament.

and that Nancy Welch & Jeremiah Welch were Subscribing  
witnesses with yourself and at his request. So help you God  
I will be sealed in open court.

I James Duvberry of the County of Warren  
and State of Georgia being in a low state of health but of sound  
mind make and establish this my last will and Testament  
(viz) First of all I desire that my undesignated Executors shall advertise  
and publicly sell all my estate both Real & Personal without  
any reserve on the fifteenth day (and days following) of  
December next on a credit until the twenty fifth of January  
thereafter I then desire that my said Executors pay all my just  
debts

(Secondly) I bequeath to my beloved wife Lucy Duvberry  
all the remaining proceeds of my property after my just debts  
are paid to dispose of as she pleases

(Thirdly) I appoint Abner Darden my Executor also I appoint my  
wife Lucy Duvberry my executrix. Signed this eighth day of  
April 1836 in presence of James Duvberry.
